In the previous issue of the Village News I mentioned that, despite strong opposition, the councils of Cheltenham, Tewkesbury and Gloucester had approved the draft Joint Core Strategy (JCS) for release and a period of public consultation will end on the 26th November. The document proposes the release of large areas of greenbelt for major housing development. The document is available on line but there are also a number of public presentation events planned. The most convenient for many in this parish will be the one at the Civil Service Club on Tewkesbury Road on 4th November from 6:00pm. Everyone will be affected to some degree by what is being proposed. There will need to be further consultation into the new year as data is still being collected for issues such as traffic management. Whether we are for it or against it we should all take the trouble to stay informed and to express our opinions. Meanwhile, the developers are likely to seek outline planning consent for the thousands of houses that they wish to build within and around our parish. The pace is quickening. Expect to hear more in each issue of Village News.

At its last meeting the Parish Council was addressed by a Community Ranger from Green Space Development. It might sound as if we had a visitor from another planet; in fact the lady in question was from the Borough Council. There are plans to plant a mixture of flowers in the park between the path and Wyman's Lane. Scientifically this is known as increasing biodiversity. To the rest of us it means flowers to enjoy and an environment friendly to butterflies and bees. The bees in particular have had a thin time of it in recent years so I am sure they will welcome this initiative!

Other potential improvements to the park were discussed. It may be possible to do further planting, some of which could be associated with next year's commemoration of the start of World War I. Also, the future of the "lightning tree" needs to be decided and the path through the park by the brook could be improved by thinning the overgrown vegetation. Funding will need to be found from somewhere for these further initiatives and money is hard to find at present. The park is a wonderful local resource and the Parish and Borough Councils will co-operate to ensure it remains as such.

The County Council gave us notice of dates when some of our roads would be closed for highway maintenance. We publicised them in good faith only to see the dates changed. Apologies if you were inconvenienced by this, but it was beyond our control. Apparently it was discovered that drainage work was required before the road surface repairs could be done. The drainage work has now been completed. A new set of dates for the carriageway repairs has been provided (see elsewhere in this issue); let's hope the County Council sticks to them. We need the repairs to Runnings Road and Kingsditch Lane to be made before the bad weather sets in as that would make major repairs impossible and cause further deterioration. We have had some

success in getting repairs done; a hole in the road outside the school and a deep dip outside Evans Cycles have both been attended to. Anyone can report road defects via the County Council web or by telephone.

Finally, getting more involved in local matters has brought it home to me how much goes on behind the scenes in the parish. Some of us recently attended the quiz night at the Village Hall. For a nominal price we were offered wonderful food, a very entertaining quiz and a licensed bar. We all said our “thank you”s on the night but events like these can only take place because a lot of people are happy to put themselves out for their neighbours. Once again a big thank you to all involved.

A scary future for Swindon Village?



Dear Neighbours,

We are at our final hurdle to protect our greenbelt land around Cheltenham.

So it's now more than ever that we need everyone to be reminded of what is going on and how to let your voice be heard... We should have a fair say – after all don't we live in a democracy?

Save the Countryside have worked closely with the Joint Core Strategy team (JCS) at the Council to encourage them to follow the promises of our government and protect greenbelt land.

So far, despite being given valid arguments, the team and Councillors voted to push forward a 20 year housing development strategy to final consultation.

It includes:

- A largely over estimated calculation of population and housing needed
- A push to develop protected greenbelt and greenfield land, or move the greenbelt for convenience
- No assurance that derelict vacant or previously developed land will be developed or regenerated before greenbelt is built on.

It is the opinion of Save the Countryside and many others that the plan has been heavily influenced by developers who of course want to maximize profits and will always prefer the cheaper option to build on a green field.

Soon we will have a planning application for an enormous development called Elms Park that will engulf our village and the greenbelt land around it.

The Council and their Joint Core Strategy team (JCS) invite us to see their plans at the times below for the whole town including this development which will be 5 times the size of our village.

We urge you to attend and make your feelings known.

Monday 4th November 18:00 - 20:30 at Cheltenham Civil Service Club, Uckington.

Below are a few key concerns from our team and shared by many.

- This is the UK's biggest ever greenbelt incursion – this will set a precedent nationwide if allowed.
- According to accurate population projections from the office of national statistics - the team who manage the census information - we don't need the volume of housing proposed. But the JCS team are using their own data.
- The JCS Team don't have the sense of urgency to regenerate derelict land first. This is not fair for our town and countryside – some good development has taken place (e.g. Midwinter Allotment site) but many other sites are ignored e.g. Folly Lane where there has been a 5 year delay.
- According to our politicians it is the law that we must develop brownfield sites first. But the JCS team don't seem to want to do this.
- Such a massive development will cripple the existing infrastructure
- Road, flood protection, sewerage, health care.
- This land is currently used for food production – it is good quality farmland and should not be wasted for developers' profits.
- Do we even need to mention there is a toxic waste site right next door!

We could go on and on... but we just ask you to please let your views be heard by the team for this consultation and on the anticipated planning application.

The Consultation runs until 26th November; please do respond with your comments – all details on how to do this, and all the documents are on www.gct-jcs.org/

Please also sign our online petition – we want to take this issue right to the top as we did before, but need thousands of signatures again.

Winter opening times for Cheltenham's recycling centre and public toilets

As the nights begin to draw in and the clocks go back, the opening hours for the Swindon Road Recycling Centre and council run public toilets will also change. The winter opening times come into play from Sunday 27 October for the recycling centre and Monday 28 October for the public conveniences.

The recycling centre on Swindon Road is a popular facility which handles nearly 7,500 thousand tonnes of the borough's waste each year. Almost 75 per cent of the tonnage of waste brought through the centre is recycled and this makes up 28 per cent of Cheltenham's total annual recycling tonnage.

The winter opening hours for Swindon Road Recycling Centre are:

Mondays to Fridays	7.30am to 6.30pm
Saturdays	7.30am to 4pm
Sundays and Bank Holidays	9am to 1pm.

The opening hours for public toilets in the town centre and town centre parks change from Monday 28 October. The toilets will be unlocked a little later in the morning and locked earlier each afternoon during the winter months. Each public convenience around the borough varies so please visit our website for times.

Scott Williams, strategic client officer at Cheltenham Borough Council, says: "We would like to remind our customers of the new opening times for both the Swindon Road Recycling Centre and our public toilet facilities. We make these changes every year for the winter season to reflect the shortened daylight hours."

Thanks be to God

“Come let us raise a joyful song to the Lord”. We certainly did at our latest Songs of Praise service. The final psalm, numbered 150, in the collection we have in our Old Testament urges us (and remember the words were written years before Jesus Christ came to earth):

“Praise him with fanfares on the trumpet,
praise him on harp and lyre;
praise him with tambourines and dancing,
praise him with harp and strings;
praise him with the clash of cymbals;
with triumphant cymbals praise him.
Let everything that has breath praise the Lord.”

At times like Harvest Festival time we are filled with the spirit of thankfulness, at times of celebration like a wedding or a birth we are filled with a desire to thank God for his goodness to us and at times when we feel our prayers for ourselves or someone we care for have been answered we want to say thank you. We show our gratitude by praising God whom we think of as a heavenly parent concerned with us - just ordinary, awkward, ‘us’.

Recognizing God’s goodness and blessings are often the cause of praise. Psalm 150 has been called ‘one of the finest songs of praise ever written’ as it summons every musical instrument to sound the praise of the God of Israel.

So we are in a great tradition of giving thanks with music and singing.

The psalmist who wrote psalm 149 tells us to “sing to the Lord a new song”. In my youth the Anglican churches seemed to have a tradition of reserve and singing with any enthusiasm frowned on. As a teenager brought up as Methodist I was very conscious of the difference in singing style. As the Methodist hymn book of the time put it: “Methodism was born in song.”

Thankfully these days we have been able to chose from whole new songs and hymns which are musically attractive and have worthy words. Our worship is the richer for this. The hymns which people chose for our ‘Songs of Praise’ services are a fine mix of older and newer hymns which enable us to render praise and thanksgiving. Thank God.

September gave us a masterful talk by John Dixon. This was not surprising since he is chairman of Tewkesbury Local History Society and an ex teacher. The subject was the large depot set up by the Americans in the Second World War where the Army camp at Ashchurch is now. Here were built vehicles for the American forces from components supplied from The States and it had a vast output of fighting machines and trucks. However, John's main topic was the influence the camp had on Tewkesbury and that Tewkesbury had on the Yanks.

Of course there was plenty of romance involved. Several Tewkesbury girls became G.I. brides and not all the youngsters in Tewkesbury after the war had the normal pallid English complexion. Some in the audience remembered those days and Elizabeth, in particular, having been born in Tewkesbury, could remember the VE day party put on by the Americans at the end of the war.

It was a very evocative talk by a very engaging speaker.

Our November meeting is now back to Plan A as advertised in the Society programme – a film of Cheltenham and The Cotswolds in the 1920s. We have now found a way of screening it and there should also be a more recent short documentary allowing a contrast and compare. In addition Eileen and Hazel will mount their display of 'Special Houses' that they put together for the recent Local History exhibition. The talk on Guernsey in the War will now take place next year. So this would be a very good evening for non-members to come along either just for the night for a very small fee or to check us out with a thought of joining.

Helen Wells has written elsewhere about the JCS position. All I can do is to echo her call to get involved although I have to say that I believe that the Borough Council has made up its mind and most of the Borough Councillors have for one reason or another gone along with it all. However, the whole matter of building on the green belt is being debated at national level with our two MPs both coming out against the plan. Our best bet may be to disprove the need before the housing inspectorate.

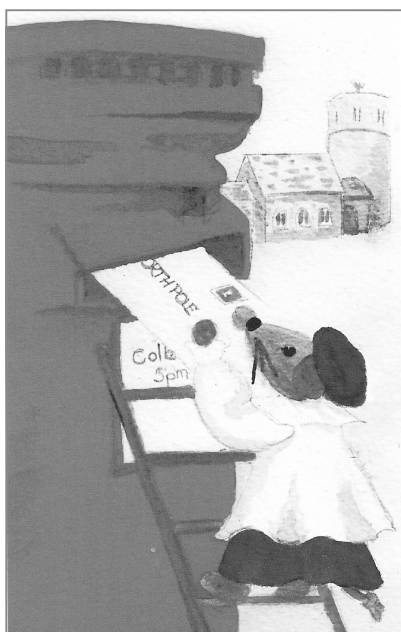
The social calendar starts to increase at this time of the year, and we have had several invitations to join other wine clubs around the area for dances, get togethers etc.

Sweden was the subject of our October talk. Lena Dyche is married to an Englishman but keeps alive her Swedish national culture despite living in this country. Sweden is roughly twice the size of Britain but with a population the equivalent of London (9million). It is a country of lakes, forests and wooden houses, no old properties as they burn down too often. There are 2 months of snow in the north and temperatures of -20°C, though more tolerable than our damp cold. Every year an ice-hotel is built where everything is made of ice, even the drinking glasses, but it all melts away after a couple of months. Stockholm, with its milder climate, is a marine city, being set amidst many islands and water of the area. The houses are triple glazed and heated geo-thermally or by oil or hydro-electricity, no gas. We were regaled with tales of festive customs, traditional food recipes, wildlife and, with the aid of slides, certainly felt the atmosphere of the country.

A number of members attended the Autumn Council Meeting at the Racecourse and caught up with all the latest developments in the county. We were invited to produce a display of handicrafts for the Harvest Festival at St Nicolas Church. A very enjoyable morning was spent at the Synagogue in Cheltenham. This is one of Cheltenham's hidden gems and has a very interesting history; we came away very much the wiser about the Jewish community in the area. Another great evening was held at the Suffolk Arms with skittles, drinks and eats. This time the choice was curry and rice or chicken and chips – here is to the next time! Briefing over we had a meal and out to the kite.
Started engines, did all the checks, then taxied out.
To runway 26 to wait for the green light.
Checked boost, pitch, flaps cooling gills, opened throttles.
Off we go.
First mark, Bell Rock.
A wave to the keepers and so the long trip starts.
Auto pilot on, course 080 at 300 feet, guns tested, radar checked.
There's an hour of daylight left as we cruised, gray empty North Sea.

As darkness falls we're into Skagerrak.
All eyes alert but there's nothing to see in the failing light.
There's a bright light ahead, it's the coast of Sweden.
We climb to 10,000 feet and then
There's a burst of fire from below, a friendly warning,
To tell us we should not be there, but we are not harming
Neutral Sweden's towns and lakes and forests.
Ahead a dark mass looms, we cross the Baltic coast.
The sweep begins.

**"There's a blip" calls Paddy, "30 degrees to port."
A gentle turn and it should be dead ahead, we thought.
Bomb doors open, and everyone ready and keen to see.
Then Paddy calls "it's not one blip, it's three."
On with the Leigh Light and there's three E boats.
A few tracers whizz by, depth charges gone and then we were past.**

**For two more hours we cruise in the Baltic, round Bornholm Island.
But no further sightings.
It is time for home and rest.
No sign of life in Denmark's farms and fields.
Then across the sea again to land at home.
De-briefing - a tot of rum - another meal and off to bed.**

Postscript

**At Cosford Museum in a far corner,
Its engines cold and silent, sits a lonely Liberator.
Amongst the relics of a bygone age.
Last year we went there, my wife, son and grandson.
Did I sit in those seats for 12 hours or more ?
Over 50 years ago.
Did we crawl through the bomb bay or through the tunnel to the nose ?
And stare at the waves for countless hours.
Those days are gone and the next Millennium belongs to the young.**

The Children's Society (formerly called The Church of England Children's Society) was established in 1881 and has always worked with the most disadvantaged and vulnerable young people. Probably best known for its work with young runaways, the Society also helps young carers, children at risk on the streets, children using drugs or living with drug users, children with physical or mental issues, young refugees, children in trouble with the law and those in care for whatever reason.

All this is happening right under our noses, here in England.

There are many ways you can help The Children's Society to help vulnerable children but the easiest, surely, is the home box scheme. I supply you with a money box and you put money in it. Some people just pop their spare change in to the box, others put in a regular set amount or money that they have saved by buying special offers in the supermarket. Whatever the reason, it couldn't be simpler. Every year, in October, I collect the boxes, count up all the money and send it to The Children's Society. At this point your donation can be gift-aided, increasing the amount received by the Society by 25%.

Pause to remember

The war memorial in Cheltenham's Long Gardens will once again be the centrepiece for the town's Service of Remembrance and civic parade on Sunday 10th November. The service will begin at 10.55am.

A lone trumpeter will play 'The last post' before two minutes of silence at 11am. After the Reveille, the service continues with prayers, hymns and the national anthem, played by Gloucestershire Police Band.

The mayor will lay the first wreath at the war memorial followed by other civic dignitaries, including borough and county councillors, and representatives from local organisations. After the wreaths have been laid, the civic party will watch from the steps of the Municipal Offices as Cheltenham Silver Band leads the march past.

In the evening, the mayor will attend the Festival of Remembrance which is organised by the Royal British Legion and held at the town hall.

On Remembrance Day (Monday 11 November) the borough council is again supporting The Royal British Legion in encouraging businesses, shops, offices and individuals to observe a two minute silence at 11am. The mayor, Cllr Wendy Flynn, will observe a two minute silence at the war memorial, with the beginning and end signalled by the firing of maroons.

Cllr Wendy Flynn said that as first citizen she counted it a privilege to be able to lead the town in this act of remembrance and would like to invite all members of the community to join her at both of the services.

Look out for your voter registration form

Every household in Cheltenham should have received a voter registration form from the Electoral Registration Office. This is the start of the annual canvass which the law says must be carried out every year. The information is used to compile a new register of electors which will be published by 17th February 2014.

Registering to vote is very simple. All you have to do is update the annual canvass form with the details of everyone aged 16 and over living in your household who is eligible to vote, and return it to us in the prepaid envelope provided as soon as possible. If your details haven't changed you can reply by text, Freephone or internet.

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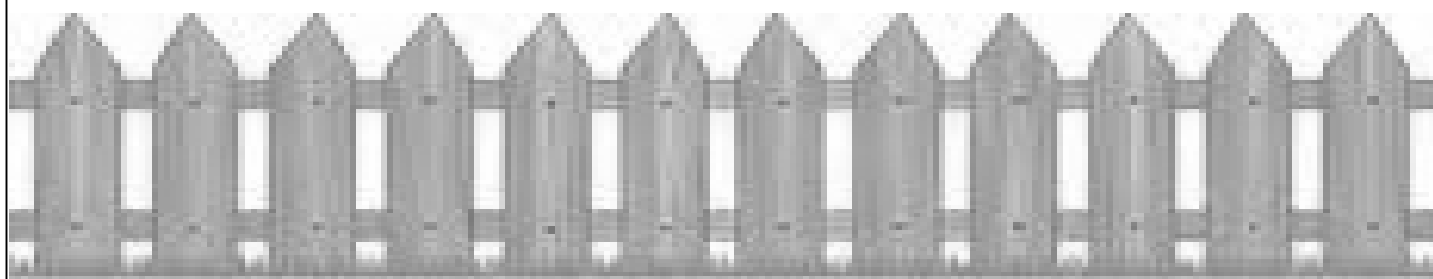
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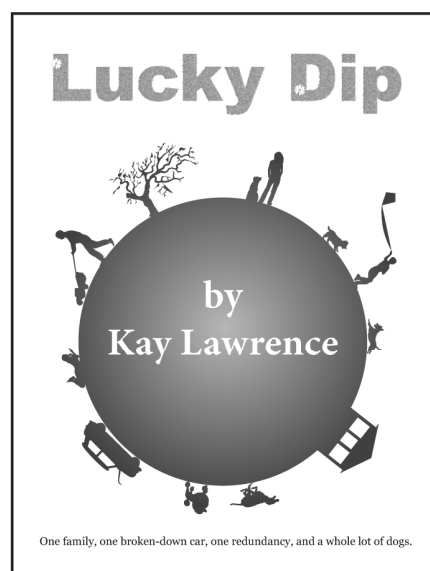
