The Annual Parish Meeting took place at the school on 13th May. Sadly we didn't attract a great turnout but many thanks to those who did make the effort. We must make sure we have a controversial topic and/or speaker next time to get people hot and bothered. Often people will only get interested and involved when something fires their enthusiasm. Which brings me nicely to the next topic. As I write elections are due to be held in a few days' time. When you read this the dust will have settled. You will have had the opportunity to vote for people to represent you at the European Parliament and at the Borough Council. Had more people come forward you would have also been voting for Parish Councillors. We all owe a debt to the existing councillors who put up for another term and were elected unopposed. There is still one vacancy on the Council. If you are fed up with hearing me talk about it join the Parish Council! In a Cheltenham pub window I saw an advertisement for new customers. It said "Experience not necessary, full training given." The same applies to the role of councillor; you would be doing good for the community and learning some new things. Many employers value community engagement so it would also look good on your CV.

The Parish Council serves an important role by commenting on applications for planning permission within the parish. The Parish Council receives notices of applications from the Borough Council and must respond within a certain time. The Borough Council publishes a list of applications each week. Looking back over the last couple of months shows what an uneven workload this represents. Two weeks can go by with no applications received while another week may see four come along. The deadline for comments may mean that an application cannot be considered at a meeting of the council. We will be looking to improve our process for dealing with applications. We have to cater for people being away and, despite all this, we need to be sure that key applications don't slip past us. Many applications are innocuous but others will clearly be unpopular. You can speak to one of the councillors if you are concerned about something that is planned (or being done without permission). Remember that everyone has a right to comment on planning applications and can do so via the Borough Council web site.

Speaking of web sites, our Parish Council web site (www.swindonparish.org.uk) is due for an overhaul. I am grateful to Mark Lawrence who has kept it ticking over for a while and been extremely helpful. I am hoping to put some new features in place and make it the "go to" destination for everyone looking for local information. If you have a view on what facilities the site should offer please contact me. I am aware that I am constantly telling people that they can report issues via the County and Borough Council web sites so one of the things I will be looking to do is make our own web site a "one stop shop" with all the links you need in one place. I recently met with a representative of Gloucestershire County Council to discuss some footpath issues. Things are changing at the County Council with highway and footpath maintenance being subcontracted to Amey. In fact this is an outsourcing operation involving County Council staff becoming Amey employees. It will be interesting to see how this works out. It has clearly been done as a cost saving exercise but, whilst it is up to them how they do it, the County Council retain a duty to maintain our highways and footpaths. Any concerns should be reported to the County Council. For footpath issues specifically we have a volunteer footpaths officer whose details appear later in the Village News.

Fly tipping continues to be a problem periodically. I noticed the following in the minutes of Swindon Parish Council from January 2011. "A door had recently been dumped in the lane. It was agreed to request the installation of a litter bin." That must have been quite a bin we were asking for!

Plastics recycling

Plans to recycle more types of plastic at Cheltenham's recycling sites

Cheltenham Borough Council will be conducting a trial over the summer to establish if it can permanently expand the range of plastics that can be recycled at some of its most popular recycling sites around the town.

Because of its light and bulky nature, recycling plastics is more expensive than recycling other types of materials, but the council recognises that there is a clear public demand for this service.

The technical term for the plastic being trialled is 'post consumer plastic'.

This refers to items such as:

- yoghurt pots
- margarine tubs
- ice cream tubs
- ready-meal pots
- plastic fruit punnets

However, this does not include:

- any black-coloured plastic
- plastic bags
- cling film (or any other kind of film)

Plastic bottles have always been part of the core group of materials that are recycled by the council but other 'post consumer plastics' previously went to landfill but, from 2nd June 2014, a three-month trial will begin to determine if these types of plastics can also be recycled at Cheltenham recycling sites in the future.

Residents who are keen to recycle this type of plastic – and help the result of the trial – will be able to take them to recycling sites from 2 June 2014. The nearest for Swindon Village will be

Sainsbury's, Tewkesbury Road and Swindon Road recycling centre.

If the results of the trial are positive and cost effective, then it is likely that this service will be implemented permanently.

In order for collection crews to manage the expanded plastics recycling service, five under-used recycling sites will close, freeing up valuable resources which can then be used on servicing the more well-used sites, especially with the expected increase in demand as a result of the potential expansion of plastics recycling.

Roger Whyborn, cabinet member for sustainability, said: "Every tonne of waste which isn't landfilled saves the taxpayer £80 so we are very pleased to be able to introduce this step forward, especially as it is in response to clear public demand.

"Cheltenham has always striven to be in the forefront of moves to divert recyclable waste away from landfill and so, as well as expanding the range of plastics recycled from 'bring sites', we are also researching the possibility of collecting these kinds of mixed plastics from the kerbside. At present, council budgets are limited, so this initiative is something which we hope to be able to implement in the future when it is more financially viable."

Local resident prosecuted for litter offence

A local resident was prosecuted for a littering offence at a hearing that took place on Monday 28 April 2014 at Cheltenham Magistrates' Court.

The man failed to pay a fixed penalty notice (FPN) relating to rubbish he had added to a fly-tipped site at Sainsbury's on Tewkesbury Road. In total, Cheltenham Borough Council issued five FPNs relating to offences which took place at this site in September, with the other four all paid on time. The fixed penalty notice was for £80, reduced to £50 if paid promptly. The offender made no attempt to pay the fine or liaise with the public protection team about his actions.

He also failed to attend court and was convicted in his absence. The magistrates imposed a fine of £1,250, a victim surcharge of £120 and costs of £317. Mike Redman, director of environmental and regulatory services at Cheltenham Borough Council, said: "This case demonstrates the council's resolve to take action against the minority of people responsible for littering and spoiling the appearance of our beautiful town. The courts take the non-payment of fixed penalties very seriously".



As I write this, over a month before my final Sunday, the 'last times' have already begun; the last time I will do this here or attend that meeting there. As you will already have read, St Lawrence Church will be closing whilst work is being done to install a toilet and to create some space for social gatherings and meetings and for refreshments to be offered. This means that the last service I will take in the church will be a wedding on Saturday 24th May. The last time I lead a service in Swindon Village will actually be in the Village Hall at 6.30pm on Sunday 8th June when we will be joined by members of the Parachute Regiment for the D-day commemoration.

It has been a real privilege to serve as a priest in this parish since 2008 when Swindon Village and Cheltenham St Peter joined the North Cheltenham Team Ministry and I became Team Rector. I give thanks for all that has been shared in this time, both joys and sorrows; for all that we have achieved together in our service of God; for all the amazing, moving, inspiring, joyful things that I have been involved with and, most importantly, I give thanks for all the people that I have shared all this with.

In my work here I have been very privileged to be able to meet and to minister to many wonderful people, a lot of whom are no longer with us but they have shared part of my Christian journey and have touched my life in very special ways and I also give thanks for them as I remember them with much love and gratitude.

There is so much to give thanks for and Gill, Anna and Simon join me in doing this and thank you for always welcoming them. The process of uprooting and saying goodbye is very hard, but I am convinced that God, who is faithful, has lots of great things in mind for the parish of Swindon Village and Cheltenham St Peter and for all the parishes of North Cheltenham and I am sure that He has someone in mind to come and lead you forward. As I thank God for all that has been over my time with you, I pray that He will pour out His blessings on all of you as you continue on this wonderful journey of faith to which He has called you. I ask you to pray for me as I take up the challenges of a new ministry in Dursley and also to pray for Gill, Anna and Simon as we all move into a new chapter of our family life.

A view from the pew

Change

"Change and decay in all around I see, O thou who changest not, abide with me."

...so goes a much loved hymn about trust in God's providence. I don't want to dwell on the 'decay all around" idea but on the fact that people living today are living at a time like no other. We're experiencing a speed of change like no other generation. A few older folk sometimes find it difficult to cope.

Arthur Mee, who founded the Children's Newspaper I used to read as a boy, also wrote a series of guidebooks in 1938 called **'The King's England'** in an engaging old-fashioned style. Here's his entry about the village in the revised edition of 1966:

"Swindon. A quiet village on the fringe of Cheltenham, it has a squat little gabled church near the small green, and a spacious Elizabethan manor house. But it is for the Norman Tower that we come, a curious structure with no two of its sides alike." (I don't think I'd agree with "squat" as a description of St Lawrence Church.)

In 2004 Barry Simon, one of our local group of keen village historians, wrote a different description from 'squat' emphasizing the unusual nature of the tower: "It (the church tower) is one of only two six-sided Norman towers in the county. Originally the tower probably acted as the nave of the church with no more than a small chancel to the east." I often try to imagine what the original building was like. It's wonderful to think for how long the church has been standing on a small mound at the centre of the village stating what is at the heart of the community.

The changes to the building (and what's in it) being enacted at present are nothing new. In a brief outline descriptive leaflet we have: "The nave and aisles were practically rebuilt in 1844" and, "the East end of the south aisle was not rebuilt, and here is to be seen one of the earliest examples of tracery ... over the central mullion."

In a major change of positioning, our probably 15th century font is being moved and lowered. The font will still be one of the first things you see as you come into the church. As everyone knows fonts are designed for baptizing young children and we enjoy whole families taking part in the little service of baptism when children, and sometimes adults, are welcomed into the Church. Fonts are always placed near the entrance door of a church. The central aisle leading to the altar pictures the Christian life journey (remember John Bunyan's 'Pilgrims Progress') of an individual. The font symbolizes the beginning of life.

Over its history our church has changed much and at the moment it is being 'reordered' or altered, to help in keeping up with the changing needs of God's people who use the building for worship.

The people who make up the 'church' of St Lawrence are continuing the work of our predecessors in making the building a place where young and old can draw near to our Maker in thought and prayer.

Well, at least this time our speaker turned up to give the talk on Church Architecture – just as well since it was me. There was a small but very select audience. Thanks to Val, Colin and Eileen for arranging tea and biscuits. It was an illustrated talk but the best visuals were the church itself. The whole of the central portion of St Lawrence's was rebuilt by the Victorians but there are plenty of signs of much earlier days. Of course the tower is the most obvious. It is one of the only two six-sided towers in the county and possibly in the country. It was built in about 1100AD by the Normans. It is thought that for guite a time there was only the tower and a small wooden chancel. However, by about a hundred years later there must have been a nave and chancel because there are Early English windows in the chancel. Next at the eastern end of the south aisle there is a Decorated window from about a century later and finally there is a Perpendicular window inserted in the western side of the tower probably a century after that. So there we have examples of five styles of church architecture. If I have whetted anyone's appetite I will be repeating the talk in about fifteen years from now. Book early. Alternatively read the write-up on the church's history in the church.

Save the Countryside fights on. As I write we are trying to influence the election but that will be history by the time you read this. Boris Johnson has come out on brown field before green field as has our beloved Chancellor. The local guys just don't want to know. The next stage will be another battle of the statistics when the new Office of National Statistics figures come out. Then another consultation (for which you may read the JCS team will tell you what they are going to do and won't listen if you try to tell them they are wrong) and finally it all goes before the Inspectorate. We are trying to get the government to tell them to get just as interested in over-supply as they are in under-supply, particularly when it means unnecessary incursions in the green belt that the government says it wants to protect.

Our garden visit this month is to Carol Kear who used to be a villager but now lives up the hill at Prestbury. Not a conventional formal garden but it does have a wild flower meadow that we hope will be in bloom and some great views. There should be tea and biscuits. Non-members welcome for a very small donation.

Still Walking the Greenbelt after 7 years



A lovely afternoon was had on Sunday 18th May by over 80 friends and supporters of Save the Countryside.

Here we all are before we set off in the sunshine to walk the beautiful green belt fields where Cheltenham Council officers working on the controversial Joint Core Strategy (JCS) would like 4800 new homes to be built. It was so lovely to see such great community spirit and determination on our fight to keep this land protected.

We have managed it for the last 7 years. When we started, so many people said, "Why bother? There will be bulldozers there next year." but, despite the odds, with perseverance we got the law changed and the diggers are not upon us. We are doing all we can to make the decision makers see sense and build the right type of housing that we really need in the right sites.

We expect to have revised population figures from the office of national statistics soon and have asked the Council to update their housing projections when they are received. Then the whole Joint Core Strategy will go out to public consultation again for the final time; that's where we will be calling on our supporters again to put in written responses over the summer. At the same time we'll be working on a local green space application for the land in question to ensure we do all we can to protect it. We will put all the info on our website as soon as we hear anything -

Kim Robinson and Alex Tomlinson are running the Cheltenham Half Marathon in aid of Gloucestershire Deaf Association.

We can barely walk to KFC, let alone run 13 miles across mixed terrain and up hills! We are pushing our bodies to the limit in order to support a local charity that provides vital help and support to deaf and hard of hearing people within the community. If you've ever had the displeasure of witnessing us run, you'll know this is the hardest challenge we've ever had to take.

Having a deaf mother has made me realise the everyday challenges that deaf people encounter. She's suffered from hearing loss for over 40 years and I've seen first hand how ignorance and lack of understanding by the general public can impact on the confidence of someone with hearing loss. There are not many provisions for deaf people in the area either. If we want to go to the cinema it's very difficult to find a suitable show at a convenient time. Going out for meals in restaurants is also a challenge as background noise is often very loud and, coupled with other tables chatting and music playing, it ends up being more of a stressful night out than an enjoyable one. With the new telephone triage systems at the doctors, deaf people are now struggling to seek appropriate medical help. I not only want to raise funds for vital support, but also to raise awareness that just because someone is suffering from an invisible disability, it doesn't make social exclusion okay. Mum has recently had a cochlear implant and is doing fantastically well; she's a completely different person! I want her story to inspire those who fear going out to the supermarket or reject party invitations due to their disability, and every penny donated goes towards providing support to the local community.

Alex and I (are trying to) run 3 times a week. We are both amateur runners so have opted for the slowly but surely technique. We've been training for a month now and have gone from "Oh my gosh my legs are killing me" to "We are nearly there, we can do this!" We're following a programme that focuses on time not distance and will hopefully be able to run 5k comfortably by the end of the month, then the serious training starts. After the 5k mark we have to add an extra mile on each week, and probably invest in some deep heat and crutches.
