Our last meeting included representatives from the County and Borough Councils. This gave us a chance to raise the profile of a number of issues. Traffic management is a key concern. New developments are likely to add more traffic to roads that are already overcrowded and the many car dealers in the area block roads and footpaths with car transporters and cars for sale. We are trying to get a meeting between representatives of the Parish Council and planners from the County and Borough Councils to discuss our concerns. We are also hoping to get a lay by in Manor Road that would enable transporters to load and unload cars without blocking half of the highway.

Another problem is litter. We have a number of fast food outlets within the parish boundary. The Borough Council representative has been asked to look into the obligations of the food outlets in respect of the litter problem. I understand that some are required to do their own litter picks though how often and over what sort of area I have no idea. Once I have that information the Parish Council can consider whether we need to remind them of their duties or even ask that they do more to address the problem.

Both the County Council and Borough Council are emphasising to us the financial constraints that they are facing. They are cutting service levels in anticipation of (or hope that) the slack will be taken up by other organisations or volunteers. The Parish Council does not have the resources to make good the services that are being cut. As an example, the County Council would like to leave bags of road salt with us. It would be up to us to store the bags and to move them around the parish as required. We may have to look to volunteers to fill the gaps in the future, but this is not easy. Aside from the natural concern that we may be taking on services that we already pay for there are the practical considerations of recruiting and organising volunteers and making sure they are insured, trained and suitably equipped. However, with everyone expected to do more with less we may have to find a way to engage volunteers if we want to maintain the quality of life we enjoy in the parish.

Selfish and dangerous parking at the start and end of the school day continues to be a problem. Parents are able to use the "Seasons" car park just round the corner (with the kind permission of Cheltenham Town Football Club). The police have promised to take a look at the situation. With everyone's patience and co-operation this problem and the danger to pedestrians, especially children, will go away.

We have received a report of a dog suffering injury as a result of venturing into the stream through the park. The Council has received such reports in the past and believe that it is due to the stream running through land that was previously used as a rubbish dump. Occasionally chemicals may leech out of the ground and affect the

quality of the stream. Whilst we are not certain that this is the case the Council strongly recommend that children and pets be kept out of contact with the water.

There have been a spate of burglaries in the Wyman's Brook area. We suggest that everyone takes reasonable precautions with regard to home security. Don't be an easy target. Contact the police if you need advice. One of the councillors is going to investigate the Neighbourhood Watch scheme. I understand that one used to operate in the area but with the sad loss of its prime mover it became inactive. Another example where volunteers are critical to success.

Prior to the last Council meeting consideration was given to a planning application for a Combined Heat and Power unit at Spirax Sarco. The Council objected on the basis that there was insufficient evidence that the question of noise had been adequately addressed. Residents of Manor Court and Church Road are already disturbed by factory operations from time to time.

At the last meeting of the Council there was only one planning application to address, that of an extension to a house in Dark Lane. No objections were raised. After the meeting we received advanced notification of a plan for a small housing development behind the church on land that was owned by the late Mrs. Davies. The land has been used as a small caravan park. The Parish Council were informed of the plans out of courtesy; a formal application will be made to the Borough Council soon. If anyone would like more information please get in touch. Once the application is made it will be visible to all on the Borough Council planning web site.

On the subject of planning, the government have in place a National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). Lower level policies have to be consistent with that. The JCS is Cheltenham, Gloucester and Tewkesbury's next level plan. Below that will sit a revised Cheltenham Local Plan that will have to be consistent with both the NPPF and the JCS (in whatever form it is finally adopted). This Local Plan is already under development and is something the Parish Council will need to engage with.

Finally, a reminder that Parish Council meetings are open to all and you can put your questions and opinions to the Council during the public session of each meeting. A resident recently asked me "When is the public session? I don't want to sit through a whole meeting". Just occasionally the Councillors (and the Clerk) feel the same way!

Cheltenham Borough Council

Mixed plastic recycling could be here to stay

Plastic recycling has proven to be a big hit with local residents and now the service looks set to stay. Following an overwhelming response to its recent trial, Cheltenham Borough Council may offer permanent facilities to recycle mixed plastics at their most popular recycling sites; cabinet members were due to discuss this in their meeting on 16 September.

A pilot project began three months ago and it meant that residents could go along to 12 of the borough's most popular 'bring bank' sites to recycle a range of mixed plastics. This included items such as yoghurt pots, margarine tubs, ice cream tubs, ready-meal trays and plastic fruit punnets. Officers soon realised how well the trial had been received as the banks were being emptied once and sometimes twice a week.

Scott Williams, strategic client officer said: "Before the trial was launched, residents could recycle plastic bottles but no other type of plastic at these banks. Almost as soon as we promoted the scheme, the bring banks were being filled with a mixture of different plastics. There is an increasing demand for this service as people become more aware of the action they can take to reduce their carbon footprint."

Councillor Chris Coleman, cabinet member for clean and green environment added: "These positive results speak for themselves and I am delighted that we are in a position to consider permanently increasing the recycling provisions available to residents. Prior to the trial, we were aware of the number of residents who said they wanted to recycle mixed plastics. We acted on that feedback and it's because of the great response to the recent trial that we feel it's only right to permanently enhance our services in this way."

If approved, residents will be able to continue to recycle their mixed plastics at twelve sites. In Swindon Village mixed plastic can be taken to Sainsbury's car park and the Swindon Road Recycling Centre.

Other materials which can be collected at the bring bank sites include cardboard, paper, glass, cans, textiles and shoes.

Bulky plastic recycling, also known as mixed hard plastics, can be recycled at the Swindon Road Recycling Centre. This means people wishing to recycle items such as plastic toys, plastic garden furniture and plastic buckets can do so at the container located on site at the recycling centre.

On 2nd November we invite all who wish to remember a loved one to come to our evening service where, as part of the service, you are welcome to light a candle in their memory. November 9th is, of course, Remembrance Sunday, where we call to mind those who gave their lives in the service of their country. This year is particularly special with it being the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of WW1. It is also special because it is when we will be inviting all who live in our parish to join us for the service at the war memorial in the churchyard at 10.55am and then to come into church for refreshments and an opportunity to view the church following the re-ordering work.

However, before all that, October is the time when we gather together to give thanks to God for all the abundant gifts given to us in creation. Our harvest festival will be celebrated in the school hall at our Together @ Ten Thirty service on 5th October, then at our evening service in the village hall at 6.30pm.

On the 18th October there will be the annual Harvest Supper and Quiz in the village hall.

So, a time to give thanks, look back, and to look to the future with hope. I do hope you will join us.

Happy New Year!! Can you believe that it is October already? As I write this, the rain clouds have descended upon us and summer seems a distant memory.

We have now been back in school for three weeks and are enjoying a number of changes. As you may be aware from the media, all primary schools in England started this academic year with a new curriculum. Whilst at first this seemed a daunting prospect, the opportunity to redesign our curriculum has proved both refreshing and exciting. The National Curriculum as prescribed by the DfE is much more streamlined and this has enabled us to create a Swindon Village curriculum that ticks all the boxes whilst at the same time is tailored to what our children need to learn and, more importantly, want to learn.

We are only a few weeks in but already the message from the children is that they are really enthused about their learning and staff are enjoying the freedoms presented to them in taking learning in new directions and following the children's curiosity.

At the beginning of term we welcomed 60 new Reception children into school and, as in past years, I am impressed by how quickly they have settled into school life. We try as much as possible to get the children into school as quickly as they can manage and, by the time you read this, all 60 of them will be in school full-time.

Despite these children having only just joined us, we are already looking ahead to our September 2015 intake. We have a series of events planned and, if you have a child due to start school next year, we would invite you to let us have your details. This in no way commits you to applying for a place at Swindon Village (and you will still need to complete the Local Authority application process) but it means that we can get in touch about our Open Days and Parent Information Sessions.

We would also like to hear from any member of the local community who would be interested in joining the school's Governing Body. This strategic group is made up of parents, staff and representatives of the Local Authority but we would like to emphasise the role we play in our community by having more representation from local people. Being a school Governor is not a huge commitment in terms of time but it is a key role within the leadership of the school. If you are interested, or would like to discuss the role further, please contact either myself or our Chair of Governors, Richard Lee, through the school office.

This year's Open Day will be on Friday 7th November. More details will be in next month's Bulletin but please put the date in your diary – everyone is welcome. In the meantime, please visit our website www.swindonvillage.co.uk to see what we have been getting up to!

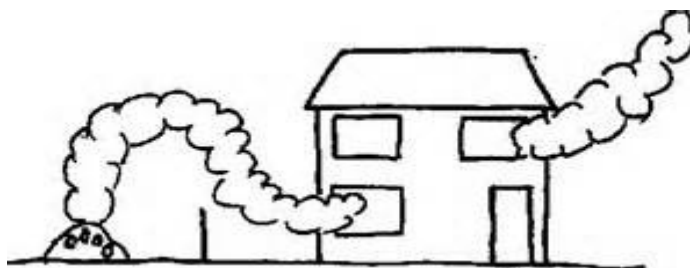
Bonfires

I am afraid that this is going to be a rather short article as we have had no new events since the last input.

Even the JCS has gone a little quiet before it goes to the next stage. This does not mean that we have stopped making ourselves heard because there are several sets of developers putting in their bids to build on the green belt and green fields around Cheltenham and Gloucester even though the JCS has not yet been considered at higher levels. Save The Countryside has made inputs trying to help similar areas under threat such as the Brockworth green belt. However, we can't take up every cause and must remember that, though our many alliances are beneficial we are really fighting for our own corner.

Personally it rankles that there are two large car parks to the north of the town centre that are ideal for housing. They have been scruffy unkempt areas ever since I arrived in Cheltenham and although there have been at least three schemes put forward to develop them in that time they are still scruffy unkempt areas. I hear that Morrison's no longer want to go ahead with their supermarket (does the town really need another?) and the group that was going to build housing seem to have hit a snag and prefer to run the areas as a particularly grabbing sort of car park.

It is a perfect location for high density housing for the young and old who want minimum garden and easy access to town. It is ideal for sustainable development. Wonderful word, 'sustainable', but no one knows what it means. The developers think it means sustainable profits for developers. I think it means development with a minimum use of resources in the construction and then the minimum use of resources over many years to keep it operating. Well-planned building close to the town centre should be able to achieve this since many services are nearby already and transport costs to work, shopping, entertainment and education should be less than living on the edge of town.

Unfortunately I have to praise developers here – and Bloor Homes at that, who are threatening our own patch. Their development near the leisure centre is good. It looks fine, has good insulation, solar panels and is close to the town centre. Pity they can't start on North Place and keep our green belt for growing flowers rather than importing them from Zimbabwe and for small farms which will allow future generations to get into agriculture and feed us when the newly upcoming economies want six times as much food as they do now and imports get pricey.

Well, that's good; filled up more space than I intended and got that off my chest. I can now potter off muttering to myself and look for something else to grumble about.

But not the wild flowers on the sports field which are simply splendid. I have thanked CBC for them on behalf of the Society.
