There are a number of consultations going on at the moment or about to start. The County Council will start a major consultation exercise on its Local Transport Plan on 20th November so it should be in full swing by the time you read this. The main method of responding will be via the Internet but the documents will also be available in the library and the Borough Council offices. There is also a Funded Public Transport consultation running at the moment. Again they are geared up to receive your comments primarily via the Internet but a number of evening events have been organised. The County Council wants to know how best to spend its money. For example, should it support rural bus routes that lose money or provide bus passes for pensioners? If you have views make them known!

Enough of the dreaded Internet for now (but more later).

A man extremely resistant to the lure of the Internet is Ian Brown, our volunteer allotment manager. I set up a meeting with Ian (by phone, not by email) and spent a very informative hour with him discussing allotment issues. Ian and our plot holders are a resourceful bunch. Many of the little problems that come up are quietly fixed by Ian and his fellow growers without any fuss and without depleting the Parish Council's funds. I have to say the plots looked tidy and productive and a credit to their tillers. Sadly I am unable to identify many vegetables in their natural state (i.e. before they reach my plate, and some not even then!).

The allotment holders' annual social should have taken place by the time this is in print. I was not able to go this year but I hope it was well attended and enjoyed. One last pat on the back for the allotments crew. I would like to thank Ian for collecting the rents and the plot holders who have paid Ian promptly on request. Before this turns into an Oscars acceptance speech I'll move on.

Staying on a financial theme, now is the time we start considering the Council's budget for next year. The year runs from 1st April 2016 (no significance there!) to 31st March 2017. A first draft of the budget will be presented to the Council meeting on 8th December and it will be finalised at the meeting on 12th January. Setting the budget means that we also set the precept for the year. The precept is the money we demand of the Borough Council. It is a demand rather than a request as in law the Borough Council must give us what we ask for. We need to notify the Borough Council of our precept demand by the end of January. The Borough Council sets its own budget and receives the precept demands of the five Parish Councils and this total sets the Council Tax we are all asked to pay. When I say "asked to pay" this is also more of a demand; I don't recommend refusing to part with the money! As with all of our meetings you are welcome to attend and view the Council's deliberations. I can assure you that a key driver for the Council is to minimise the burden it places on local residents.

We have talked quite a bit about the park in our recent meetings. The council would like to make it more accessible to wheelchair and pushchair users (perhaps by extending the path and adding access points) and also provide recreational facilities for older children. These plans may be ambitious but some funding is available from the County Council for projects such as this. We can but try.

Back to one of our biggest gripes; transport issues. Bollards have been installed on Manor Road in an effort to give pedestrians some refuge from the car transporters that plague the village. The Parish Council have been campaigning for a long time to get something done. Whether this is the best solution could be debated but at least we have the attention of the County Council on the matter. Let me or one of your councillors know what you think.

When the wind is in the right direction (or is it the wrong direction?) we are on the receiving end of odours from the Stoke Orchard landfill site and also (possibly) from the sewage treatment plant at Brockhampton. It is important that these occurrences are reported, otherwise there is no evidence that a problem exists and (surprise, surprise) nothing gets done. This is probably more of a problem in the summer but I promised I would remind you that the Environment Agency would be delighted to hear from you on 0800 807060. I hope the number is right; I don't want a little old lady in Arbroath receiving lots of calls about odours in Swindon Parish! The number is also on the parish web site.

Speaking of the web site (another smooth transition between topics!), I know the Internet is not everyone's cup of tea but the parish web site is geared towards giving you the information you need in a simple way. It has links to everything from last posting times to planning applications, bus timetables to reporting fly tipping. The address is:

I will probably write a bit more about it in future articles. Please take a look. You'll be glad you did! And of course I would love to receive your feedback (whether you like it, whether there are things you want added or if you have found something that doesn't work). In fact there is a simple form on the web site that you can fill in to get in touch. I am delighted that a number of residents have already done so.

Finally, I am exhausted from writing these articles so Karen has said I can take a break until mid January. Whether you will be contributing to Cheltenham's night time economy (that's what the Borough Council calls folks getting tipsy in the High Street) or curled up in front of "Strictly" with an eggnog, I hope you have an enjoyable festive season. If you struggle to fill the lull after Christmas remember the parish web site.

A view from the pew

Christmas is coming, the goose is getting fat

I was thinking the other day in November about Christmas 2015 and I wondered why Christmas for me has such overtones to do with the way I feel about it. I look forward to celebrating the birth of Jesus, Son of God, as a helpless baby in the poorest of circumstances in a cattle shed (or cave) - what we call the Nativity. Many things go to make up Christmas for me and there are many items that make it a worthwhile experience every year.

They say that Charles Dickens, the author of A Christmas Carol, 'invented' Christmas - perhaps it's true - but history tells us that the Christ- Mass has been celebrated for thousands of years. I found a description of a Christmas celebration in the 19th century which sounds as though it wasn't particularly religious:

The Old English Christmas

"Of the 'high days of the Calendar' Christmas was always the one which held the chief place in England..... As soon as the Christmas holidays had arrived work and care were universally thrown aside and, instead of devotional practices by which other countries commemorated the sacred occasion, England rang from one end to the other with mirth and joviality. Christmas carols were trolled in every street, masquerades and plays took possession of houses and churches indifferently. A Lord of Misrule, whose reign lasted from All-Hallows Eve till the day after the Feast of Pentecost, was elected in every noble household to preside over the sports and fooleries of the inmates, while each member prepared himself either to enact some strange character or to devise some new stroke of mirth." (Illustrated London News December 20, 1845)

Talk about Merrie England! There's no reason why celebration shouldn't be part of celebrating the birth of the special baby - so let's celebrate the birth in 2015!

When I think back I find I have memories I treasure of Christmases past. I remember when the my children were young, on a cold and snowy evening, we trudged with our dog to the top of Tickenham hill. I felt while we were up there, on the night before Christmas, an overwhelming sense of serenity and peace. Anyway the experience was so absorbing that it has stayed with me. I can remember similar feelings as I came out of St Lawrence Church in the early hours after the first Holy Communion (Midnight Mass). (And thank Goodness for being able to see glorious starlight at night at Swindon Village). These were feelings of peacefulness and thankfulness for God's goodness.

I, for one, would find it difficult to do without church bells, candles big and small and other Christmas lights like those on Christmas trees. As with other ancient churches in the Cheltenham area we're fortunate to have our bells and bell ringers, and organists and choirs, aren't we?

A happy Christmas, one and all. As Tiny Tim says in A Christmas Carol: "God bless us, everyone."



The subject of our October talk was Industrial Archaeology in the County. And what a lot there is to cover. One tends to think of Gloucestershire as a gentle rural place without much industry but that is far from the truth. The county has plenty of hills and from them run streams. And that means an easy source of power and power means industry. That led to the many mills around Stroud and the valleys that were particularly famed for their red cloth which clothed the British Army in battle. Indeed Bedlam Mill in Swindon Village (across the Tewkesbury Road off Hayden Lane – it is still there), while originally a grinding mill had become a fulling mill by 1800. That is, it dealt with cloth and, on a fine day, the land around it would have had fulled cloth drying in the wind.

Gloucester too had the canal from Sharpness which brought trade and hence manufacturing. Alongside the canal were the wood yards and from this Morelands made their famous England's Glory matches which many of us will remember from our youth. In fact Gloucester was quite a manufacturing centre and the Folk Gallery still has pin making machinery to view.

The several other canals in the county made sure that Gloucestershire had plenty of industry and the means to import and export material and goods. Locally the Coombe Hill canal was used to bring coal and materials to Cheltenham before we had the benefit of the railways.

So, many thanks to Ray Wilson for a fascinating talk that brought back many memories to those who have lived in the county much longer than I have.

Now we are round to that time of the year when the committee are scratching their heads over next year's programme. It should all end up similar to this year's with seven or eight talks, mostly on local history or nature because they are the ones that are available, a nature walk, a garden visit and the usual garden party in August. We do try to have a talk on planning matters but they are less easy to come by and so if anyone has any ideas we would be glad to hear them.

If you are not actually a member yet please do think of joining. Even if you never manage to make the meetings we would be very glad to have your moral support for when we have to protest about inappropriate development. It is not just the Joint Core Strategy. In the past we have fought to save Bedlam Mill (see above), not to have a modern glass and metal house right behind the church, not to infill the Manor grounds. We have even fought for the Homestead to be allowed to expand and for some other developments which the local planners were not going to allow – so we are not just Nimbys – though I wear that title with pride. Membership is £5 for singles and £10 for a family.

And even if the formal programme is of limited interest to you there are one or two members who would be happy to take you on an evening or afternoon stroll around the village and tell you what they know of its history and maybe even provide an

historic picture of your house. New arrivals to the village should be aware that we still have for sale copies of the seven editions of the The Swindon Village Collection that covers much of the recent and ancient history of the village.

So on to the AGM. This will take place in the Village Hall on the evening of 20th January 2016 at 7.30pm and should take no more than 30 minutes. Then there will be a tea break followed by the screening of some historic photographs of local scenes and bits and pieces of interest. If you want to become a member do come to the AGM. However, non members are welcome to turn up at 8pm for the tea and the photo show. Alternatively phone **Barry Simon on 521723** and he will be happy to come around and sign you up as member or invite you round to No 3, The Hall for a cup of tea.

Looking forward to seeing you soon.

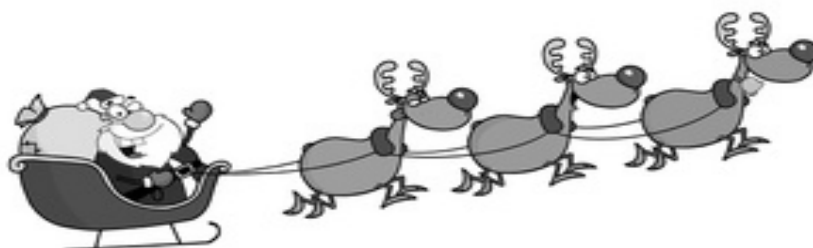
