Swindon Parish Council

(Full minutes of all Parish Council meetings are available on the Parish website www.swindonparish.org.uk. They are also available on request from the Chairman.)

Did you know that an election does not necessarily imply voting? Every parish council seat in Cheltenham was up for election this year (and also half the seats on the Borough Council). I can report that four of the existing councillors on Swindon Parish Council made the decision to stand again and two decided to step down. Sadly no-one new came forward. That leaves us with four councillors and five vacancies. Because the number of candidates standing was not larger than the number of seats available those persons standing are deemed elected; no poll (or vote) will be necessary. Whilst this saves the Parish Council money I think it would have been far healthier to have a range of candidates step forward. While there are vacant seats the Parish Council can co-opt new members, so I will continue to try to persuade people to give something back and join the Council.

Sometimes I put a "deliberate" mistake into my articles to see who has remained awake whilst reading. I did this last month. I said that the next collection of allotment rents will be in Autumn 2019. I fell off my chair when I read that back. Of course I meant Autumn 2018. Now it is the turn of the allotment holders to pick themselves up off the floor. Sorry everyone.

The Parish Council year ends on 31st March. Even without the election process this is a very busy time. As required by law we commissioned an independent audit of how we had conducted our business during the year. I have received the auditor's report and, whilst there are things we can look to improve, the auditor did not find any substantial issues. This is a healthy process. It is always possible to learn and do better.

I mentioned last month about the changing audit regime. In a nutshell, we must produce similar end of year documentation as in previous years. However, provided this information is made available to the public on a website the requirement for an external audit for smaller councils has been waived. The role of the external auditor has been replaced by public scrutiny. That means you! Our website is packed with information about our accounts and our governance. I have put the accounts for the year on the site already, with more information to follow. I will shortly publish the formal declaration of a period during which the public can exercise their right to ask questions. In practice, I don't mind receiving questions at any time. Please take a look on our website and feel free to ask any questions you want.

The Horse Trough Task Group (if I can call it that) met at, funnily enough, the horse trough. We met to discuss the future planting and maintenance of the trough. I was delighted to meet Sarah for the first time. Sarah, along with her sister, has given us brilliant year round floral displays in the trough. Sarah now lives in Cleeve (their gain and our considerable loss). Jackie and Victoria, who run the local Rainbows and

some of the Rainbows, were also present. They have agreed to incorporate watering of the trough into their Friday evening routine. The fourth participant was Neil. Neil is a local man who runs his own landscape gardening business. He is taking over responsibility for the planting from Sarah. The last person present was your humble war correspondent, whose only role was to express our collective gratitude for what has been done in the past and what will continue to be done in the future.

I have been advised that there will be a talk entitled "Building with Nature" by Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust on Thursday 14th June at 7.30pm at Swindon Village Hall. It will be interesting to hear how organisations such as the Wildlife Trust work with developers to mitigate the effects of developments on the flora and fauna.

Speaking of flora, work has taken place on vegetation around the railway bridge on Hyde Lane that necessitated closing the road. Network Rail share our concerns about the bridges on Hyde Lane and Swindon Road. As a result they may be supportive of our attempts to reduce traffic speeds and have a roundabout installed at the junction of Windyridge Road and Swindon Road.

We were anticipating seeing work being done on new play equipment in the park by now. It appears the wet weather has prevented the Borough Council from making a start. Hopefully we will have more to report next time.

We aim to install a parish notice board close to the Cross Hands on Tewkesbury Road. People living in the area around River Leys and Glynbridge Gardens are very much part of the parish. It is important that we serve them. We are not simply "The Village".

At the time of writing the Annual Parish Meeting is only a few days away. It needs either free food (which we have planned) or a controversial speaker (neither Trump nor Putin were available) to pull in the crowds. Talking to other parish clerks it is clear that all parishes struggle to get people to come along. I am sure we will get a few more than usual because of the presentation of his Freeman award to David Iliffe. David served the parish for many years and deserves a big thank you. I'll report on how the evening went next time, for those of you who didn't make it!

12th Feb 2013 was my first meeting flying solo as clerk. Prior to that I spent a month or two shadowing Stephen, our previous clerk. During that time he was a model of efficiency and I learnt virtually nothing. It is being thrown in at the deep end that kick starts the learning process. Forced to make sense of things for myself I started to piece things together. Clearly earlier this year it was my fifth anniversary as clerk. I have looked round the area but I can't see any new blue commemorative plaques. This also means that you will have received over 50 of these articles from me (or the same article 50 times!). I indicated earlier that there is always something new to learn and, hopefully, something new to pass on.

The evening finished with a buffet which provided an opportunity for us all to catch up with recent events and to share memories.

War in the Air 1914 to 1918 A talk by Nigel Thompson

In April our spy, Robert Skelt, returned to bring us the next instalment of the wartime code breaking saga, this time focusing on Bletchely Park itself and the people who did the work. The talk was very well attended, but then the modern day Bletchely Park is just down the road and there is a lot of local interest. I know Robert has several more spy based talks so he is certainly on the list for consideration next year.

Our May meeting will feature Nigel Thompson, who gave us the excellent talk on Iberia last year. This talk will be on the rather different subject of Air Warfare from 1914 to 1918 and I understand will concentrate on two participants in particular, Baron Manfred Von Richtofen and Mick Mannock. I think we can consider this to be the Captain D R C Gabell RAF memorial lecture. Captain Gabell features on our own war memorial and if anyone queries why a person of army rank appears as a member of the Royal Air Force I can explain on the night. However, on a rather different subject, we now have an extra meeting to take place in June which is not on the current programme. This organisation is called Building with Nature and has been put together by The Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust and the University of The West of England. Anyway, two of the members of this organisation are going to come and tell us what it is all about and what their objectives are. This is a joint initiative between Save the Countryside and the Swindon Village Society. The meeting will be in the Village Hall on Thursday 14th June at 7.30pm and Professor Gemma Jerome and a colleague will tell us what they are about. This meeting is open to anyone in the village though we will charge £1 to any non-members of the Village Society to help defray expenses.

And finally I can confirm that we will be hosting a Heritage Open Day event in the village on Saturday 15th September. This will feature a talk on 'The History of Swindon Village' in St Lawrence's Church at 2pm given by that well know history expert – me – who did not even get an O level in the subject. The talk will be followed by a walk around the village led by Eileen Allen and myself and tea and buns in the church. The event will be free but the tea and buns will not.

We enjoyed a lovely evening in April with our guest speaker Frances Benton telling us about her Passion for Pearls. Frances brought several pieces of jewellery with her (possibly a few hundred) from large pearl necklaces to tiny pearl earrings. Frances told us how the cultured pearls were made by inserting an irritant into the shell of an oyster or mussel which they then, over a period of about five years, cover with microscopic layers of fine sand. These are still classed as real pearls as they are made the same way as Natural pearls found in the oceans. Natural pearls are found very rarely and therefore command a very high price. Frances lives in France for about six months of the year and then travels the U.K. for the other six months, giving talks on the pearls, raising money for charity each time.

We have had to cancel our trip to Webbs of Wychbold and the Jinney Ring Craft Centre as there wasn't sufficient interest to make the trip viable. The committee will meet again and see if we can come up with something of interest to our members.

We will still be holding our coffee morning on Wednesday 13th June and there will be more details of that next month.

Building With Nature

A talk by Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust on Thursday 14th June at 7.30 at Swindon Village Hall

Dr Gemma Jerome and Dr Garth Parry, directors from the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust have agreed to come to talk to residents about their project on 'Building with Nature' that they are currently undertaking on the Elms Park planning application.

Building with Nature is designed to support end-users and those involved in the planning, design, construction and long-term management and maintenance of green infrastructure to deliver high quality features which secure benefits for health and wellbeing, sustainable water management, and nature conservation.

End users of Building with Nature include developers, local planning authorities, landscape architects, ecologists, engineers, construction site managers, highways contractors, transport planners, horticulturalists, designers, arborists, facilities managers, and other and built environment professionals involved in design, implementation and long-term management and maintenance. It will also be of value to new and existing communities who wish to better understand how high quality green infrastructure can deliver benefits to the built and natural environment, to people and to wildlife.

Why has Elms Park been certified with Building with Nature? Elms Park is the largest strategic allocation in the Joint Core Strategy for Gloucester, Tewkesbury and Cheltenham. The size and significance of the scheme presents a unique opportunity to showcase the potential of large developments to contribute to priorities for green infrastructure at the county-level.

Persimmon Homes and Bloor Homes have designed a range of green infrastructure features to deliver multifunctional benefits. For example, the green and blue corridor that runs the length of the development forms a landscape-scale feature and provides functions for water management, ecological connectivity for wildlife, and acts as a site of accessible greenspace for people to connect with nature close to where they live. Given the scale of the development, it will be delivered across several phases, each delivering a key component of the wider green infrastructure framework. The Green Infrastructure and Biodiversity Management Plan will guide the implementation of features that link up across different phases to secure benfits for people and wildlife into the long-term. The development plans also show a commitment to supporting existing and new communities to access and enjoy green infrastructure from the first phase onwards.

University of Gloucestershire

Age 22 to 80? Missed out on university? Here's a great opportunity to study at the University of Gloucestershire, just down the road from Swindon Village.

This year, the University of Gloucestershire has launched a brand new English degree. Professor Arran Stibbe, who lives in Stantons Drive, is the course leader and would be very happy to talk with you about the possibility of studying at university from September 2018.

"There are two main reasons why you might want to study English. The first is because you want to gain confidence and skills in using language to influence, persuade and inspire. The second is because you love reading and want to explore great works of literature." – Prof Arran Stibbe

For entry, it's not necessary to have A-levels if you have experience – for example, if you write reports at work, have read widely or done some creative writing. And it may well be possible to get a loan from the government to cover the fees.

The course is delivered in small groups within a friendly and supportive environment and assessed by coursework. You can choose your own mixture of literature, language and practical communication depending on your interests.




