Norman Baker - Some Prestbury History

(Full minutes of all Parish Council meetings are available on the Parish website www.swindonparish.org.uk. They are also available on request from the Chairman.)

The Council has been discussing the provision (or lack of provision) of defibrillators in the parish. The consensus is that, even though we hope they will never be used, it would be good to have better coverage in the area. We know of one in Sainsbury's and one in Next but haven't been able to locate any others. We are thinking of getting one for the outside of the Village Hall that could provide aid to users of the Hall and also users of the playing fields. The way our dog chases a ball in the park I keep thinking he might require one at any moment. If a defibrillator is never used it is a waste of money but if it saves a life it is priceless. Anyway, I will get some quotes. We would be interested to hear your views. I just hope there is a defibrillator nearby if I am ever offered a pay rise.

You will all (hopefully) be aware that the Village Hall needs new members for its committee. By the time you read this a meeting will have taken place between hall users, the members of the current committee and the parish councillors. If you are interested in stepping forward to take a role in the continuing story of this important resource (or know someone who might be) please get in touch.



We continue to discuss maintenance of the sundial mosaic in the park. We have identified a local company that can help specifically with the mosaics themselves but the problems appear to run much deeper than aesthetics.

The foundation of the mosaic appears to have been inadequate with a large crack having appeared across the surface. This leaves us in a bit of a quandary. We want the mosaic to be robust so that we don't face the same problems again in a few months time. If anyone knows of any specialist firms active in this field we would love to hear from you.

I know we have quite a few people in the parish who are happy to volunteer their time. We conducted a litter pick in June (so long ago!), a useful and sociable activity. I was going to plan one for September but, due to unforeseen circumstances, I will have to delay it until November. I am trying to co-ordinate with the Borough Council's litter picking activities so that we don't follow each other round the streets! We have also talked about tackling some overgrown vegetation issues. It would be good to set regular dates so that people can plan ahead and make sure they are not on holiday when there is rubbish to pick up! There is a town that is training pigeons to pick up cigarette butts and put them into a machine that then gives them a reward. How many pigeons would it take to get a shopping trolley out of the brook?

We have in the past highlighted the problem of football teams leaving plastic bottles at the side of the pitches in the park. I recently received information on a survey done along a 100 metre section of the Severn. Over 800 items of rubbish were collected, 87% of which were plastic.

On the plastic theme, as with all of us, councils can strive to "do the right thing" and end up getting bitten in the posterior. Chepstow Town Council became the first council in South Wales to achieve a "plastic free" certification and, in a move described as beyond irony, celebrated by unveiling a large plastic banner.

There have been relatively few planning matters to address in recent meetings. The Council continue to see planning applications where the quality of the information supplied is so poor that it is very difficult to form an opinion. In the interests of cost saving the Borough Council no longer supplies the Parish Council with paper copies of applications. We'll need to get one of these 60 inch plasma TVs to view them. It would also be good for Match of the Day.

I have caught on to how Karen makes it look as if I am rambling at great length. I give her an article that fits on one page, and she increases the font size to stretch it out. I go for quality rather than quantity though I am sure I generally miss both targets.



George will work in all the Team churches but his main duties will be with us in Swindon Village and Elmstone Hardwicke; we are looking forward to working with him in this new phase of our church's life.

The garden party worked out well this year. The galoshes were not called for and a pleasant evening was had. It was very nice to have some new members along and even some potential new members. The party was held in our new garden and kitchen at No 3, Swindon Hall.

It was interesting to be able to show those who had not been here before a view of the Hall not normally seen. The south west corner suffered a fire in 1940. It was reported in the papers but because of war time restrictions there was no mention of the probable cause, an incendiary bomb. Now at the time Swindon Hall was being used as an Army transit camp. However it is most unlikely that the bomb was actually aimed at the camp. It was much more likely that it was one of the many hundreds of bombs scattered liberally over the county, either jettisoned by enemy aircraft that thought they were under attack or had a technical problem or merely because they saw a light below. Many were on their way to bomb towns in the Midlands but were glad of any excuse to not visit the more heavily defended towns.

The result at Swindon Hall was that at war's end one corner was in a bad state with the roof missing and considerable fire damage. When the Hall was later sold for conversion into five separate dwellings the developers decided to merely do the best they could with this corner and made what had been a two storey structure built in about 1750 into a single storey cottage. The rubble was all put into the cellar which was sealed off, the damaged walls were stuccoed and painted white, Crittall windows were installed and a single slope tile roof put on top. This gave the rather incongruous effect of a rural cottage attached to a Georgian Mansion. In our small rear garden there is a flight of fine stone steps that once led up to the tennis courts that now go nowhere, but from the top step one can see the results of the Luftwaffe's efforts by way of missing walls, hanging doorways, isolated chimneys and a blanked off house end. Indeed in our attic there is one area where the old charred lath and plaster work can be seen, along with the names of L/Cpl Hubbard and Sapper Scanlon chalked on the beams in memory of their wartime stay here.

The single storey cottage was designated 4, Swindon Hall but over twenty years ago it was bought by No 2 and converted to student accommodation. When the last owners of No 2 moved on we bought half of what had been the old No 4 and it was made into a large new kitchen. In the roof area we found the base of two fireplaces that would have heated bedrooms before

the Luftwaffe's modification process and signs that one part of the kitchen would once have housed the master's coach. My wife would like to send belated thanks to the Luftwaffe without whose efforts she would never have got her new kitchen.

Finally, to our small contribution to Heritage Open Days. We had about 30 people attending, split about half and half between villagers and those from further afield. It is particularly pleasing to have those who live here taking an interest in our history. The weather was fine and I think all those who came on the walk enjoyed it. Thanks to Eileen who provided a really good display about all those villagers who took part in the First World War including a few who are not included on our war memorial. And, of course, many thanks to Karen and the team who provided teas and buns. I doubt the proceeds bought more than half a church roof tile but I was certainly glad of my cuppa after a couple of hours of talking.

So, at the end of the camp, the Scouts had earned three badges: the Aeronautics Activity badge, Meteorologist badge and Navigator badge, but they will have to wait a while longer for their flights – which we hope will take place over one of the coming weekends.

As a footnote to the Air Camp it is worth mentioning that after several years of training, one of our leaders, Shane, managed to complete his PPL (Private Pilot's Licence) at the end of August this year – Congratulations, Biggles (as he's now known)!

As we head into Autumn, we start another Scouting year and all the sections have had their first few meetings. We have plenty of fun and adventure planned over the coming weeks and months including Harvest Festival, a sleepover for the Beavers and a canal weekend and the Operation Bald Eagle camp for the Scouts.

Urban hedgehog project launches in Swindon Village

Hedgehogs are the UK's favourite mammal according to a recent poll but many people may be surprised to learn that gardens in towns and cities such as Cheltenham and Gloucester are vital for these endangered animals.

Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust has launched a project to improve urban green spaces for hedgehogs and urgently needs the help of residents in Swindon Village. These volunteers will create Hedgehog Ways, neighbourhoods where hedgehogs can move safely between gardens. Volunteers will receive training from specialists at Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust and ongoing support.

"Thanks to information from local people, we know that a number of hedgehogs are already living in this area. Hedgehogs have the potential to be safe and supported in these places, with the help of local people. Gardens can easily provide food and shelter for hedgehogs, and help them to move to other areas of safety," says Georgia Spooner, Urban Wildlife Project Officer at Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust.

Hedgehog Way is supported by the People's Trust for Endangered Species and the British Hedgehog Preservation Society. Volunteers can spend as little or as much time as they can spare and will assess gardens and other green spaces to see how hedgehog friendly they are; start to make these places better for hedgehogs, and report sightings of hedgehogs.

Once a familiar and well-loved visitor to our gardens, hedgehog numbers have fallen significantly in the last few decades. It is estimated that there are 1.5 million hedgehogs in the UK, down from 36 million in the 1950s. According to the People's Trust for Endangered Species, losses in towns and cities appear to have slowed, and the number of hedgehogs found in urban gardens at night may be increasing.


