(Full minutes of all Parish Council meetings are available on the Parish website www.swindonparish.org.uk. They are also available on request from the Chairman.)

We have received what appears to be some good news on our Local Green Space (LGS) proposal. The Planning Inspector who has been reviewing the Cheltenham Local Plan has been questioning whether the proposed area is justified or whether more land should be released for housing. Councillor Wells (wearing two hats) has been leading the fight for our LGS for longer than she cares to remember. If you see a woman in the village wearing two hats it is probably Councillor Wells. The Planning Inspector has now issued a report. Regarding our LGS, the Inspector concludes, "In view of the scale of new and existing development which it would serve and the buffer which would be provided between the existing and new housing, I consider the area to be justified". This is very positive. The Inspector's full report can be accessed from our website. On 14th October the Borough Council voted for the Cheltenham Local Plan to go out for public consultation. When I have more news on this I will put it on our website.

After a period of relative inactivity we have seen a flood of planning applications. Many are for changes to, or refurbishments of, industrial buildings on Kingsditch Industrial Estate. It can be difficult to get excited about these, except ones like the Vibixa site which is prominent, full of asbestos and being totally demolished. Other applications that are of great local interest are the plans to build houses on the edge of the village along Brockhampton Lane, plans for the corner of Manor Road and Runnings Road, and the housing development behind the church. There are also plans to move The Range to the former Homebase site and Matalan to Gallagher Retail Park. We note with regret that the Homebase closure has seen some locals lose their jobs. There is a list of planning applications on our website. It is easy to view and comment on any that are of interest.

I was regularly giving you snippets of legislation as it affects parish councils. I haven't done that lately and the clamour to resume this feature has become impossible to ignore. Regarding planning applications, once an application is validated by Cheltenham Borough Council it is published and a window of (normally) 21 days opens. During this period comments can be submitted to the Borough Council. The Parish Council is a statutory consultee. The Borough Council must tell us about applications in our area, and we have the right to submit comments. As a member of the public you also have the right to have your say. The Borough Council makes the final decision, hopefully taking into account comments received. For uncontentious applications the decision can be made (under delegated powers) by a planning officer. Large or contentious applications are dealt with by the Borough Council's planning committee.

Now another nugget we have recently learnt about the law. At the time of our last parish council meeting James, one of our councillors, was working away and tendered his apologies. However, in his typically public spirited way, James agreed to dial in to the meeting so that he could participate via video or telephone conference. In order to make decisions a parish council must have a quorum (i.e. at least a certain number of councillors present). There are nine seats on the council. A guorum requires at least one third of this number to be at the meeting, or three, whichever is the greater. By either calculation three is, for us, the magic number. We had three councillors in the room. Just as well because the legal advice we received subsequently stated that councillors cannot "attend" a meeting remotely using technology, at least not in the role of a councillor. James would not have counted towards a quorum and could not have participated in voting. This is only one example where the law is, perhaps, behind the times. It is only very recently that parish councils have been permitted to use Internet banking. However, as we all know, the Internet will never catch on.

The Parish Council recently resolved to increase the allotment rents from £25 per annum to £27 per annum. Going way back there were some years when rents weren't collected and there were some years when, despite inflation, the rents stayed static. At the price now set we believe the allotment plots represent great value for the allotment holders and an important source of income for the Council. With Ian Brown, our hard working volunteer allotment manager, at the helm the rents have always been delivered promptly to the Council. Ian will shortly be asking plot holders for their 2019-2020 rents.

In this article I have been talking up our website. The website provides a great way to update you between issues of the Village News. We are also in the process of setting up a Facebook page. If you feel that technology has left you behind don't worry. There are free resources and courses available that will help you get up to speed. In particular, Gloucestershire Libraries offer a world of services beyond simply lending books.

Speaking of books, I wonder if there is "A Dummy's Guide to Parish Council Procedures"? Perhaps, as a dummy, I should write one.

As we enter once again into our penitential season, we are urged to remember and to offer thanksgiving for past lives. Whether we dwell upon lives which have directly influenced our own or whether we are asked to respect the memories of lives which in one way or another have governed how human life has been given a particular kind of freedom, it is a time where, more generally, life is reflected upon more deeply and significantly.

Sadly, there is no escaping the fact that, in thinking about life in this context, there exists an acknowledgement of our human frailty. We will all die one day, and as factual as this may be, we naturally find it a difficult subject to discuss openly. It remains challenging for many reasons but perhaps at the heart of the challenge is accepting that even when lives are lost, there is meaning to be found. Our Lord confronts this notion head on. Resurrection can only occur as a result of death and this thankfully puts death in a position of not having the last word. Believing this as Christians is very important as it gives us a remarkable sense of hope that actually begins to give a fuller meaning to understanding life.

There is something beautiful about all this being punctuated by the events of Advent and then Christmas. Advent is often thought of as being penitential because of the Christian symbolism of the liturgical colour purple, but Advent's witnessing is actually twofold. While it is a season in which Christ's first coming to us is remembered, it is also a season where remembrance itself directs the heart and mind towards the second coming of Christ at the fullness of time.

With this in mind, as difficult a season as it can be; remembering is actually such a very important part of our Christian lives. It helps us to understand that death is not a threat of a return to an idea of 'nothingness', but that life, yes even eternally, is very much written into the very nature of what is created.

A Letter of Thanks

On the 5th October, my husband was pushing me in my wheelchair up Manor Road. We all know of the terrible condition of the footpath making it very difficult to negotiate and very unsafe at times for pedestrians with wheelchairs and prams. We had just reached the better part of the footpath and were about to cross from one side of Manor Court to the other. Because of the steep slope between pavement and road my wheelchair toppled over into the road with myself and wheelchair on top of my husband. Both of us were unable to move. However the quick appearance of complete strangers was amazing; car drivers, ramblers and neighbouring householders swiftly came to our rescue.

The lady driver first on the scene unstrapped me from the wheelchair and organised a team to lift us up - not an easy task as we can hardly be classed as lightweights. A very kind gentleman, who was staying with friends in the village, pushed me to the top of the incline and then on to our home in Dark Lane to see that we were able to transfer safely into the house. He was extremely helpful and even visited that evening to check that we were both alright, although rather shocked by the incident.

Unfortunately we didn't ask the names of our helpers but Alan and I are very grateful for your assistance and send our heartfelt thanks to you all. You really were good Samaritans and have restored our faith in Human Nature.

The Swindon Village Society

For our September meeting our old friend Arthur Ball returned to tell us about the wildlife of the Dowdeswell Reservoir Nature Reserve. He has been active there for many years putting up bird boxes and encouraging all wildlife. The good news is that the reserve is now owned by Julian Dunkerton, one of the founders of Superdry. He is keen to improve it as a reserve and is having much of the scrub and overgrown bush cut back to make access easier for people and for wildlife and plants. So at present some paths can be difficult but give it a year and the reserve should be much easier to visit. As it is there is a great array of wildlife there or passing through. The great news for me was that a few months ago an Osprey visited the reserve and also toured the local area. This was just at the time that I saw a large bird swoop for a fish in the River Severn outside the sailing club I use. I did not identify it at the time because I had never heard of an Osprey visiting Gloucestershire. Now I know there was one in the vicinity I am ninety percent certain that that is what I saw.

I really should be braver in these matters. A few years ago, when on a reconnaissance of the Coombe Hill Nature Reserve to check out just how muddy it was a day or two before a Village Society visit there, I saw a large white bird that I did not recognise. After a bit of stalking it seemed like a Spoonbill, a bird I had only ever seen pictures of in books on Africa. Back at the car park there was a chap loaded with cameras and binoculars who asked in passing if I had seen anything. I said that I knew it could not be so but there was something odd down there that looked like a Spoonbill. He was off like a shot and I thought no more about it. When the Society visit took place two days later the place was crawling with birders all down to see the African Spoonbill. We all saw it too. I mentioned this to my son who works in London and he mentioned it to his boss, a very keen birder, who pooh-poohed the idea of a Spoonbill in Gloucestershire but nevertheless checked on his computer and came across a report on the Gloucestershire birding website from a very reputable birder who mentioned visiting Coombe Hill where a bloke in the car park had said he thought he had seen a Spoonbill and, amazingly, he was right. So there I was immortalised on the internet as 'a bloke'. The son's boss was duly impressed and I am sure it was this which led to my son's promotion not long after. At least that is what I claim whenever I see him.

Our talk in November will be by Angela Applegate and will be about Gustav Holst, our local musical hero.

Still looking for inspiration for next year's talks. If anyone has ideas for talks on local history, conservation or how to be a Nimby please let me know.

It was with great shock and sadness that we heard of the death of one of our members. Maureen Brookes, or 'Mo' as she was always known, had been a member for many years and, even when she moved to live near her daughter in Churchdown, continued to be a member of our WI. She had been a very active and supportive member, serving on the committee and holding several posts there in the past. A large contingent of members attended her funeral. A friend to all who will be greatly missed.

The speakers at our October meeting were Mike and Jenny Beacon who spoke about the founder of the Abbeyfield homes, Richard Carr-Gomm. He had been an officer in the Coldstream Guards and was awarded the Croix de Guerre. On his return from Egypt he travelled across Europe disguised as a tramp experiencing a profound personal change through events on the way. He bought a house in Bermondsey where he invited four poor pensioners to live with him. The first of three homes in Cheltenham was opened in 1961. With a motto of Care, Independence and Companionship there are now 200 'managed' houses plus 250 Abbeyfield homes and 60 care homes, some being abroad, and have supported some 300,000 people. Richard Carr-Gomm appeared on 'This is you Life' with Eamon Andrews. Jenny spoke of the effect of loneliness on our lives and how Abbeyfield aim to resolve this by providing a supportive life to the older generation.

The Centenary Exhibition and Thanksgiving Service in the Cathedral was a great success. We managed to fill the whole building, including the Cloisters, with events and displays. Our WI had a table displaying our activities amongst the many others in the Cloisters, including a memorable one by the Butterflies WI, that was formed inside Eastwood Park Women's Prison. An early morning visit to Ben Pauling's Racing Stables by members of the Racing Club proved very interesting, with a walk to the gallops and a tour of the stables to meet some of the many horses and hearing of their successes and hopes for the new season. Ben was certainly very knowledgeable and informative about each horse and his methods of training and running them.

Socially, we met at Wendy S's for a coffee morning and enjoyed a Chinese meal at the Mayflower Restaurant. A crafty day was spent making silk decorations for Christmas.

The month of November looks very busy. We have our Birthday meal and celebrations at Doubletrees and a retiring committee meal at L'Artisan, a

1st Swindon Village Scout Group

As we head into the autumn months, our Scouts have been making the most of the mild weather before the frosts of November lead us into another winter. It's been a busy few weeks as you can see...

In September, the annual Canoeing and Kayaking County weekend camp was held on the River Avon at Croft Farm, Bredon's Hardwick. This event is organised by Shelley Wright from Cheltenham and has become a regular fixture on the calendar for everyone interested in Canoeing and Kayaking – youngsters and leaders alike. Over 60 people were in attendance this year and had an excellent weekend of fun and games with plenty of time spent on the water.

The last weekend of September saw two of our Scouts join Mike, Ash and Sos on the County Canal weekend on Narrowboats on the Grand Union Canal just west of London. Once on board, we travelled north from Hillingdon in Middlesex up around Watford towards Hemel Hempstead and then back again on the Sunday. The countryside along the canals there is beautiful and with a lock every half a mile or so, there is plenty to keep everyone occupied. The Scouts had to plan their own menu and, on the Saturday morning, moored the boat outside a conveniently situated Tesco's, while they went and bought all the food. The weather was dull and a little drizzly on the Saturday. Then on Sunday - the forecast heavy showers held off until lunchtime, so we just about got away with it. However, the dodgy weather didn't spoil the fun and the Scouts got totally immersed in life on the canals and took it in turns to steer the boat and work the locks. They also got to help prepare and cook all the meals (Sunday breakfast was a 4-hour pancake festival!) and take it in turns to do the washing up. They all returned home full of their adventures and I'm happy to report that we all managed to stay out of the water this year!

At the beginning of October, several of our young Beavers, Cubs and Scouts attended the Harvest Festival Service held in St Lawrence's Church. It's lovely to see the youngsters taking an active part in the service.

On the following weekend, eight of our Scouts and four leaders took part in this year's Operation Bald Eagle camp – our final Scout camp of the year. The camp was held at Rhydd Covert Scout Camp Site - right next door to the West Midland Safari Park in Worcestershire. Here we joined together with around 500 Scouts from Herefordshire, Worcestershire, Warwickshire and Gloucestershire. Despite a forecast of rain all weekend, Friday

evening and Saturday daytime were mainly dry apart from a little drizzle. We arrived at around 7:30pm on the Friday evening and the Scouts set about pitching their tents in the dark before tackling the Friday evening challenge - this year trying to identify 20 different sounds at various locations around the site! On Saturday, after a cooked breakfast and flag break, our Scouts started to tackle some of the 30-day bases around the campsite, solving puzzles and completing tasks, challenges and games. Then on Saturday night they joined more than 60 teams and set off on a 7mile incident hike around the local area with 16 activities to complete at the various checkpoints around the route. There was great team work in evidence throughout the weekend and both of our teams did very well in the damp and showery conditions - one team not arriving back on site until 1am! So, a very tired bunch of Scouts awoke on the Sunday morning to find it pouring with rain from first light until 10am when it eased to light drizzle. After another cooked breakfast, we had a 10-minute break where young Dylan was invested into the troop, before we all had to pack up everything and take down all the tents - soaking wet for the second consecutive year. Village Hall

The winter nights are beckoning and it won't be long until the frosts return but here in the hall we're toasty warm thanks to a new pair of clever thermostats. Further energy savings should also be achieved from our new ambient cooling system for the cellar. This system draws in cold outside air to cool the cellar rather than using the air conditioning unit - large savings of CO2 and money can be made during the colder months so we've got this installed just in time for chillier nights. Speaking of CO2 savings, our solar panels have started to reduce their production now that the autumnal equinox has passed and we're into the darker half of the year; that said, in four months we've produced almost 2MWh of electricity, saving almost 5000kg of CO2 and just over £300 from our bills.

Meanwhile, the bar has had an upgrade with the addition of a large screen and speaker which can be used for watching TV, listening to music or simply enjoying Terry's latest holiday photos by screen mirroring from a phone.

Our bookings continue to be busy (**svhall.co.uk**) and lots of parties, functions and celebrations have been successfully held throughout the year, all ably assisted by our growing team of volunteers - several new bar helpers have been shown the ropes lately and the more the merrier ensures that it's not the same faces every night! If you're at all interested in helping the team in any capacity then please get in touch via the website or Facebook page. The Friday night bar is still being well supported and we're looking good to continue it throughout the winter - again none of this could continue without our volunteers so a big thank you to all!

Finally, there's an embryonic plan to hold an informal, family friendly New Year's Eve party for the village along the lines of a bit of music, some bubbly, a bite to eat (everyone could bring a dish) and the obligatory countdown to midnight. There's a small team of volunteers who would love some extra help; the plan is to keep the costs to a minimum and make it a village and family-centred night for everyone.

Next year we'll continue the theme and plan some more social functions for the village - such as a film night, quiz night, tapas evening, Eurovision

night, Summer Ball... this is our hall so whatever is wanted we can make it happen. If any of this sounds like your cup of tea and you fancy organising a night for the village then get in touch and we'll help you in every way we can. The hall takes a lot of running behind the scenes so the committee are more than happy for people to step in and take charge for a night - we'll give you every bit of support so you won't be on your own!
