Swindon Parish Council

(Full minutes of all Parish Council meetings are available on the Parish website www.swindonparish.org.uk. They are also available on request from the Chairman.)

We have bored you to death with tales of the Joint Core Strategy (JCS) and then the Cheltenham Local Plan. We are on the home straight, honestly. The public consultation on the Cheltenham Local Plan has now opened. If we wish to retain our area of Local Green Space within the Plan then it is important that local residents express their support. The consultation is online at http://consult.cheltenham.gov.uk./. The consultation closes at midnight on 16th December. It is possible to contribute by means other than the Internet. The consultation may be accessible in libraries (but not at midnight so plan ahead!).

More improvements have been made to the Village Hall, the most obvious external change being the installation of LED floodlights. Bad news for the Village Hall is that we have experienced a couple of examples of fly tipping in the car park. If you have any knowledge of who is doing this please report them. People are working hard to ensure that the Village Hall survives and thrives. They do not deserve this.

Forget the exciting news that, after three years of getting nowhere, Brexit has been delayed by a few weeks. I have some even better news. Our new noticeboard has been installed! It is close to the Cross Hands pub and is intended to serve our many parishioners who live south of the Tewkesbury Road. It was expected to take about a month and actually took fourteen. See the parallel with Brexit now? Buoyed by our success at procuring a noticeboard we have now ordered a bench. Watch this space.

The November race meeting was to see changes to the local car parking arrangements. The intent was to improve the lot of locals who can find it hard to park in their own roads. Mandarin Way had been brought into the "exclusion zone" and had been coned off to prevent parking without a permit. Unfortunately the Temporary Traffic Regulation Order that would trigger the issuing of passes was not scheduled to start until 1st January, leaving the residents with the worst of all worlds. The Regional Head of Operations for the Jockey Club agreed that the cones should be removed. The next test of the system will be for the Festival in March. Odds of two to one on that it will all work perfectly.

The Parish Council has been made aware of a number of road drains that are blocked. These need to be reported to the County Council, and we have raised the matter as a general problem with our County Councillor. A few days after the November Parish Council meeting the unrelenting rain caused flooding in Manor Road. We recognise that Church Road (near the school) is always a problem during wet weather and will continue to petition the County Council to do something about it.

In the course of my work I have come across a website that is used by all the agencies that are likely to dig up your road (which seems to be just about everybody). If you type "one.network" into your browser you can zoom in to any part of the country to see what roadworks you are likely to encounter. According to the website I see that (at the time of writing) BT was stuffing Rivelands Road with poly ducting. Practising for the turkey no doubt.

Whilst I am "on the road", the experimental traffic scheme that resulted in the closure of Boots Corner to general traffic is reaching the point where it must be made permanent or abandoned. A meeting of the Traffic Regulation Committee of the County Council will be held on 16th December and must recommend the way forward to Gloucestershire County Council's Cabinet. The aims of the scheme (reducing air pollution, improving the area for pedestrians) are very laudable but it has attracted its fair share of criticism.

In planning matters, revised plans were submitted for the corner of land where Manor Road and Runnings Road meet. The revisions have done away with the proposed egress from the site close to Dog Bark Lane but the fact that the site is on such a busy junction remains a concern to the Council. Further comments have been submitted.

We are now in the period when we must prepare a budget for the next financial year. A draft was considered by the Parish Council at its meeting in November and agreed (with minor changes). This will be published on the website in due course, as is all our financial information.

Karen recently passed me the files for some older editions of the Village News. I have put them on the website so you can now go back to October 2013, your own personal time machine. The October 2013 edition was number 398, so there were another 397 before that! In fact Karen found a scan of the first ever issue (October 1974), so I've added that for good measure. At that time a timid young man was wearing flares and watching emerging bands called Queen and Genesis at Cheltenham Town Hall. Thirty eight years later he became the Clerk to Swindon Parish Council!

I always forget the lead time involved in producing articles for the Village

News. The last issue (or the one before it) must have been the Halloween edition. Although I am writing this in November this must be the one where I must remember to wish you a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

What's next with our local green Space and the Cheltenham plan? Please take 5 mins to respond online.

The new Cheltenham Plan, which is a planning policy document covering our borough until 2031, is reaching its final stages of production.

To ensure that the Council are following the correct procedures, the final main modifications to the Cheltenham plan as requested by the Government Inspector during examination earlier this year, must be open to formal consultation.

Our council planning team did share an exhibition in our village hall on 12th November but, as this was not really advertised by our council planning team, many local residents may not have been aware of it.

The Proposed Main Modifications Consultation runs until 16th December 2019 and the key Main Modifications documents have also been published on the examination library webpage.

You can find this by googling Cheltenham plan main modifications.

After a long time re-arguing our case for local green space around Swindon Village, where no building will take place, I can confirm that the final agreed version that you see below, is included.

I would like to ask us all to encourage our neighbours to respond positively to the consultation with our support of this local green space just in case it's thrown up into the air again.

As we journey through Advent and move towards Christmas and a new year, it can be both challenging and at the same time enriching for us to discover new ways in which to prepare for, and learn from, the Christmas story. Christmas, like Lent and Easter, can also be a time where we focus upon reconciliation of varying kinds. Families tend to come together at Christmas time in a way that may differ from other times

during the year. Some adults who celebrate Christmas but who may not necessarily hold a strong belief, come into contact with the wonder of the Christmas story, even if it may only be through the eyes of their own young children.

During Advent we focus more richly on the prophets. They play their role in pointing to the idea of reconciliation as a uniting of heaven and earth through the birth of an innocent baby as well as towards the eventual death of an innocent man. It may feel as though we get ahead of ourselves if we are to speak also about St Paul during this season, but I believe we can apply much of the meaning of reconciliation, which is very central to Paul's ministry. Through the incarnation, it can be argued that the act of reconciliation first makes its mark in Christ, as a baby, at Christmas time. His bursting in on our lives begins the transformational process of uniting all things under Godhead. It is a beginning that almost requires that we see the act of redemption in a child-like way before we grow to maturity and are better able to deal with the harsh realities of the final outcome.

God coming into our lives as a baby is yet another demonstration of the very real fact that he gently shares in our humanity in its fullness and journeys with us. It is a demonstration of love that bares an indomitable imprint upon what it really means to be human and in Christ's case, divine.

Perhaps the lesson is that it is essential we go back to a time when we were children ourselves, so as to innocently fall in love with again, and understand in its completeness, the divine mystery of the Christmas story from the perspective of a child; and so fully enter into the mystery of a world reconciled.

A very peaceful Advent, Christmas and New Year to you all.

The Power of Silent Prayer

We enter perhaps the noisiest time of the year! May I offer an antidote? Our brains seem full of juggled priorities. Not for nothing did the famous Russian spiritual writer St Theophan the Recluse advise us to 'stand with the mind in the heart before God and do so unceasingly'. For years I've been trying to do this and master the art of silent prayer. One person told me she felt her head might burst, she could hold no more information – and so St Theophan goes on to advise: 'the head is a crowded rag market: it is not possible to pray to God there.' Sometimes my attempts find me staring into space, thinking about the work I need to be doing. Other times are better, when I approach prayer from the silence of the heart rather than the head. Then I can feel my attitude and perspective changing with every minute I keep my eyes closed.

Silence is difficult. It's confusing, like a vacuum that must be filled. What, exactly, is supposed to happen while sitting for long, potentially awkward periods of time? I can share some of my experiences.

First, every time I enter into silent prayer it takes a while to get going. I'm thinking about the tasks that need to be done. My mind never shuts off, unless I put my foot down and say, enough is enough. Entering into silent prayer takes work. It takes discipline and courage to cut off everything that distract our minds and hearts to arrive at a sacred, blessed and productive silence. However, I do know that the more I try, the better I become.

The best silent prayer comes with an overwhelming feeling that I am not in charge. It seems to me that this simple mindset is the remedy to stress, heartache, and anxiety. I get fooled into believing that my daily tasks, obstacles, and struggles are bigger than they are. But my prayer puts things into the proper perspective. I get a profound sense that God is in charge. And no matter what struggles come my way, God has a way to deal with them. I like to think that I trust God, but silence helps me to live that trust.

God is mystery. Silence is one of the most profound ways to dive deeper into the mystery that is God. I've grown to appreciate this idea through what is called Ignatian Prayer. This is where we sit in silence for up to say twenty minutes a day while using imagination to contemplate particular episodes from the Bible. Here, we place ourselves actually in the scene, perhaps just behind Jesus or at the arm of a disciple, or merely an onlooker from a nearby doorway – but we are there! Of course, God works through all things, so He certainly works through our imagination. Ironically, my silent prayer seems incredibly loud, interactive, and engaging. It is also emotional and intimate. The silence allows God to speak to my heart in mysterious ways. We share intimate moments and deepen our relationship. In my Bible contemplations, Jesus treats me as one of his disciples and entrusts me with tasks to further his mission. He trusts me. He embraces me. He sticks up for me. He loves me. The silence is a sacred space for me to be with Jesus. For me, this is the power of silent prayer: it creates a deeper relationship with an infinite and mysterious God. It is a deep friendship.

I do find myself with a slight problem in reviewing our October speaker – it was me. Modesty rather precludes my saying just how good it was but nobody left during the talk but then again I had locked the door. The subject was The History of Aviation Quite Close to Swindon Village. There is more than you would think. Probably of closest interest is the crash of the Wellington bomber in the area which is now the allotments. It is still unclear as to exactly what brought the aircraft down and the memories of those who remember the event vary considerably. What is pleasing is that, at our own Remembrance Service at St Lawrence's this year, once again the names of the eight men from three counties who died in the crash were read out. They died on our patch; it is good that they are remembered. Some time ago the area was investigated with a metal detector and a few bits found. As a result I still have two small pieces of the aircraft and half a Royal Canadian Air Force cap badge which were given to me because of my RAF background.

I am also still amazed that the first automatic blind land system for BEA's Trident aircraft was developed in Swindon Village by Ultra Electronics, an offshoot of Smiths. Their place was just behind what is now Halfords and the buildings are no more. And even now just across the road in Arle, Douglas's are still making tugs for airliners. And let us not forget Stoke Orchard airfield where many of the Army glider pilots who took part in Arnhem and The Crossing of The Rhine received their basic glider training.

And once we start on local ballooning in the 1800s, the first successful British parachute descent into Montpellier Gardens, Brockworth, Staverton and Morton Valence airfields I could go on forever. But fortunately I didn't – the yawns were getting too obvious.

There is no meeting in December so the next event will be the AGM in January. As ever we will try to keep the AGM to a minimum and then have a cup of tea. This will be followed by Eileen Allen giving us some updates on Swindon's history which have come to light as a result of her work on The Victoria County History of Gloucestershire. Visitors will be welcome but should come along at 8 o'clock in time for the tea.

We do have some ideas for next year's programme but if anyone is able to point us towards good speakers that they have heard we would be happy to hear from them. Remember the subject matter should be related in some way to our role as a small civic society or our side interests of local history or conservation.

Village Hall

Things are looking bright at Swindon Village Hall and, as the Good Book didn't say, "let there be light and there was light in the form of Light Emitting Diodes and they were good!" LEDs are semiconductors that emit photons (light) when a current flows through them and the first red LEDs were invented in the 1960s. They have developed over the years so that they can now be used for general lighting in industry and around the home. Our modern, super bright LEDs were a recent breakthrough developed by several Japanese, Korean and Chinese companies in the 1990s; first blue and then white ones appeared on the market and now they are the light source of choice in many scenarios. Their prime benefits are low energy consumption combined with a bright output and their cost has reduced drastically in recent years. In the Village Hall, we've replaced the older fluorescent bulbs with LED strips and the fluorescent tubes in the ceiling panels with LED panels and the outside lights with IR-triggered LED floodlights. Not only do they give more light than before but the energy consumption is drastically reduced. As an example, the stage was previously lit with 8 incandescent spotlights which used 60W each; the six new ones not only give out more light but consume a total of just 42W which is less than one of the old bulbs and saving a whopping 438W - such is the dramatic effect that LEDs can have on energy consumption and why they became eligible for an energy saving grant. Regular readers may remember that the summer solar panel installation was partly paid for with an EU energy saving grant administered by Severn Wye for community organisations. Well, the scheme was extended and we capitalised on this by successfully applying for another grant to help pay towards the Nest thermostats and ambient cooling system that I mentioned last month as well as the LED lighting upgrade. They have all come just in time for the darker, colder nights and should mean the Hall is being run more efficiently than ever.

In October we were fortunate enough to be selected by a website design organisation called "do action" who offered their services to four local charities to improve their web presence. Our website was originally created by Maija and has been instrumental in improving our bookings - all of our bookings requests come from there and get emailed to Jana for her to liaise with the users. The second "do action day" to be held in Europe was run from a Cheltenham hotel and we were given a team of five web design professionals who volunteered their time to give us a new and hopefully improved website. The day would have cost a typical client approximately £2500 so we were very fortunate to get this for free. Please take a look over the next few weeks as it goes live at **svhall.co.uk** - there's scope to tweak it with more photos, blogs, discussions etc. so we might be

adding more features as we go along - some of you may have met Gemma during the Friday night bar nights and she's a whizz at these things.

As the nights are drawing in, you can get a warm and friendly welcome at the Village Hall bar every Friday night from 6.30pm. Bookings at the Hall are still going strong thanks to Jana and Karren's expert admin skills and the Friday bar nights continue to be well supported with lots of happy customers and volunteers. Keep your eyes peeled for updates on the New Year's Eve party too - this year will be an informal ticketed event (but not expensive) and we'll keep you updated via our Facebook page (search and follow "Swindon Village Hall" for more).

Finally, the forthcoming General Election on 12th December is using the Hall as a Polling Station - you can register online to vote at **www.gov.uk**/ **register-to-vote**.

May I take this opportunity to send all our readers our Best Wishes for Christmas and the New Year.



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
