#### Swindon Parish Council

(Full minutes of all Parish Council meetings are available on the Parish website www.swindonparish.org.uk. They are also available on request from the Chairman.)

Welcome back after the holidays.

We have talked about the consultation on the Cheltenham Local Plan. This closed in December.

The Parish Council made strong representations that the Local Green Space defined around Swindon Village should be retained, a conclusion also reached by the Planning Inspector examining the JCS. We now await the latest Planning Inspector's conclusions.

However, when one consultation ends another two rise up to take its place. Firstly, there is now a draft Local Transport Plan produced by the County Council. Seeing that traffic management is one of the key issues we face this is a critical document for us. The Parish Council will be responding but everyone is entitled to have their say. The consultation ends on 26<sup>th</sup> March.

Secondly, the Borough Council have issued draft plans for what they are calling the Cyber Central Garden Community. It is proposed to build houses, high-tech businesses and leisure facilities near to GCHQ. Whilst this is not in our area the resulting traffic probably will be! The consultation ends on 17<sup>th</sup> February.

Both these consultations can be accessed from our website. Even if you do not wish to respond to the consultation yourself you may be interested to find out more.

We have taken possession of a bench which will be installed at the entrance to the Amenity Area off Manor Road. We have accepted a quote for doing this work and look forward to seeing the finished result. The bench will bear a plaque to the memory of the wonderful Elizabeth Heathcott, long time servant of the Parish.

I mentioned the problems of drainage in Church Road. I was recently passing by and noticed that, although most of the roads were dry (well, dryish), water continues to burble out of the service covers in the area. The picture shows the cover of a safety valve opposite Quat Goose Lane (I keep wanting to call it a manhole cover but you'd have to be pretty small to get down the hole).




Water also emerges from a gap between kerb stones and from a manhole cover near the entrance to Smythe Road. We are pressing the County Council to take a look at drainage in the area and along Manor Road which has flooded recently.

If all went according to plan the Traffic Regulation Committee of the County Council met on 16<sup>th</sup> December to recommend the way forward to Gloucestershire County Council's Cabinet for the "Boots Corner" traffic routing changes. As I write the minutes of the committee have not been published on the County Council website, so I'm still holding my breath.

Demolition of the Vibixa site has started. Hopefully the new industrial/ commercial development will ultimately tidy up a corner that is currently a bit of an eyesore.

Across the road outside Evans Cycles there are some steel cabinets and an aerial that are part of the local mobile phone infrastructure. Apparently 5G is coming. 5G phones will be capable of receiving data at a higher rate than your home broadband will support. The good news ends there. Because 5G uses higher frequency signals the aerials required will be taller and more of them will be needed. Plans have been submitted for replacing the existing equipment. The new aerial will be nearly twice as tall. The Parish Council is concerned that the siting of the new equipment at this location could mean that there will be no room to replace the two mini roundabouts with a better traffic management solution. The government wants to push through these upgrades to ensure good coverage across the country. The picture overleaf shows the height of the new aerial compared to the existing one.

You may not know 5G from a hole in the ground (oh, covered that already) but you might have a view on the height of the aerial.



The Parish Council have at last received the results of a traffic volume and speed survey that looked at Church Road, Manor Road and Wymans Lane. We are looking at the data to see what conclusions we can draw.



We have another litter bin! This one is at the end of Stantons Drive near the fields. The path is very popular with dog walkers, unfortunately including the type who leaves their dog bags in the hedge for someone else to clear up. There were no excuses for this before, now there are DEFINITELY no excuses!

Although Christmas is only just behind us and a new year has begun, it's only February and yet we are on the cusp of the beginning of another Lent, and it all kicks off




with Ash Wednesday on the 26th. Once again our foreheads will be marked with the sign of the cross testifying to the call to return to our Lord God, but it also marks the fact that our God walks with us too on all of our journeys.

The children in school, by choice and with permission sought, very often enjoy having their foreheads 'ashed' at the end of an assembly. More than anything else, I think they have fun teasing one another about how ridiculous they look. On the way out they're pointing at one another and laughing. It's all a bit of fun for them, and beneath the symbolism, a bit of fun for me too. Yet, as they walk out of the hall and make their way to their lessons, I can't help but think about those small feet, which will grow as they themselves grow. As they do more and more journeying, leading them to come to know themselves in ever new and exciting ways, the hope is that their walks will bring them into a relationship with God of varying kinds.

While it is true that a journey begins with one solitary step, what Lent actually does in many ways is invite us to actually stop walking, or at the very least to move along at a slower more purposeful pace. To reflect and to contemplate and to listen to that still small voice of calm is never an easy thing to do at the best of times; but whilst the goings on of the world don't stop just because Lent has started, if we don't at least try to stop and look around once in a while, we could miss the point of life entirely.

During the weeks of Lent we are again encouraged to take stock, to reexamine and re-imagine our lives. We are encouraged to seek out what is important to us and to not be afraid to ask for or acknowledge what it is we want or feel we need. Any spiritual journey worth the effort must begin with an answer to a simple question posed by Jesus when he found two disciples walking behind him. He stopped walking, he turned around and asked, "What do you seek?" (Jn 1: 30-38) This is a question we are encouraged to ask ourselves also; and at times we must stop to give an answer in the same way those disciples must have stopped to hear the question. What do you want, what is it you need?.....What can I do for you?

#### The Swindon Village Society

We had the AGM in January and to no one's surprise the committee were re-elected en-masse. The AGM was followed by an update on some new findings on the village's history by Eileen Allen. Eileen has been working with The Victoria County History of Gloucestershire for some time now. The VCH has already produced a definitive history for much of Gloucestershire but Cheltenham and its environs remain to be done. However work is now underway and it will include Swindon Village. Quite a bit of this work is based around the work done to produce the seven volumes of The Swindon Village Collection. It will be interesting to see how close we got when the experts have finished.

Eileen read to us a number of newspaper articles covering the more mundane aspects of life in the village over the last two hundred years. Deaths, fires, straying horses, storms, pollution of the River Chelt, children's parties, fights and the proposal to site the town abattoir in the village all featured. The Village Society would certainly have fought the latter proposal but even without our help it was moved elsewhere.

We now have something of a programme for this year. In February Celia Hargrave will tell us about her splendid garden at Trench Hill that we may try to visit once we have heard how it was built. March sees a talk on The

Gloucestershire Regiment at the Battle of Waterloo which will interest my wife since she had a great-great-great-grandfather involved in that. We always try to incorporate a nature walk and in May John Heathcott will take us to Crickley Hill where we will annoy any wildlife that dares to show itself, as well as finding out about the history of the site. I do know that it was the location of a battle thousands of years ago. I also know that it now has a coffee shop.

In June Judie Hodson, Chair of The Friends of Pittville Park, will tell us about the history of the park and how it is run now. In July Peter Gill will tell us about Cheltenham at War.

October will feature Chris Witts who will give us a talk on working on The River Severn. I believe that he manned the cargo barges that used to be a regular feature on the river. I may be wrong here but I think he was involved in the action when barges hit and destroyed the old railway bridge across the Severn before the current road bridges were built. We are also trying to get a nicely seasonal talk on mistletoe for November but that is still to be worked on.

There are also a couple of dates still being worked on.

So if you are not a member do think of joining us. The fees for this year are £7 for a single and £14 for a couple or a family. It is so useful to be able to say that we represent a good selection of the village when we wish to protest about some of the more silly proposals by developers. Even if you are not particularly interested in the talks there is always our annual garden party in August when you get a free glass or two of lukewarm fizzy.
