Some months there is so much to say that harsh editing is required to reduce the length of the article to something manageable. This is not one of those months, so the focus is on quality rather than quantity!



The bench that we purchased for the Amenity Area was due to be installed in early February. The contractor engaged to install it agreed a date but didn't keep to it, so we have changed installer and hope for better fortunes. At the moment the bench is in the garage of one of our councillors. If you want to sit on it I'm sure she won't mind.

At the time of writing the foundations have been dug and the shuttering has been built.

Long time member of the Council (and more recently Vice-Chairman) John Conmee has resigned from the Council. We are sorry to lose John and are grateful for his contribution. Time for others to step up. If you are interested in the area and what happens to it then give the Parish Council a go. You can tailor your commitment to your circumstances. Please get in touch.

Continuing the theme of local pride, the Great British Spring Clean will be taking place between 20th March and 13th April. Spirax Sarco are happy to get involved and Cheltenham Borough Council will supply bags and litter pickers (the devices, not the people; that's where you come in). We have decided to do our bit on Wednesday 25th March, meeting at 1:00pm at the car park near the Mary Godwin Pavilion in Swindon Village park. Last time we had a mix of Spirax employees and local residents. A good time was had by all and a huge amount of rubbish found its way to a better place, leaving a better place behind. I hope you will join us for an hour or two. I know that one local resident has "gone solo", picking litter along Manor Road. He raised an interesting question: if people see someone picking litter does it make them more or less inclined to drop more? Do they think "I'll drop litter because someone else will deal with it"? Perhaps I am being optimistic but I like to think they will say to themselves, "People take a pride in this area, so I'll take my rubbish home and deal with it myself".

The Parish Council has submitted a response to Cheltenham Borough Council's Cyber Central Garden Community. Although the development is outside the parish it will have major implications for us. In summary the Council has the following concerns:

- Traffic management and the lack of integration between existing infrastructure, this scheme and the coming Elms Park development
- Even poorer air quality as a result of traffic congestion
- Potential for increased drainage and flooding problems
- Lack of clarity about new facilities such as schools and doctors' surgeries

The full response from the Parish Council can be viewed on our website.

A quick reminder that the consultation on the Local Transport Plan produced by the County Council ends on 26th March.

I mentioned last time that the future of the "Boots Corner" traffic management changes was unclear. Clarity has now been achieved with the County Council deciding that the experimental changes should be abandoned rather than become permanent. You may have noticed that you can now drive past Boots again. I guess you still could during the experiment but it would cost you £60, as one of my sons is only too aware!

The demolition of the Vibixa site is in progress. You have probably heard it! It is fair to say that the noise and disruption has made life difficult for residents living nearby. On behalf of the Parish Council I have written to the developer asking how long we can expect this process to take. I presume that soon there will be lorries moving the mountain of rubble to somewhere else, creating a whole new set of problems.

We are starting to think about the Annual Parish Meeting. This is a public meeting where you can hear what the Parish Council has done (or tried to do) on your behalf and raise any questions that you might have. An opportunity to talk to us and find about the Council and what it means to be a councillor (hint hint).

Dear All...

As you read this Lent will have begun...

It is another time of preparation, a bit similar to that of Advent but with a difference. It's a time of self-examination, fasting and abstinence for some people and a time of prayer and the deep reading of scripture for others.

Typically Lent is thought of as the season where we give up something – usually something that would be very hard to shy away from, making the task all the more difficult and worthy.

Some people describe Lent as the inward-looking season that provides opportunity to be, at the very least, honest with ourselves and Easter more outward-looking so we can share the results of that honesty and be open with others.

There are confessional words used for the order of Remembrance Sunday and at other times, which I have always thought better suited to Lent:

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned in thought, word, and deed. We have not loved you with our whole heart. We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. In your mercy forgive what we have been, {help us to amend what we are, and direct what we shall be; that we may do justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with you;} through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

I believe these words, in particular those bracketed and italicised, capture the experience of Lent and Easter most fully.

If we are prepared to take up the challenge and look inward and wade through certain aspects of our lives, despite the fear of what we may find in that inner place, we may come at the end to a clearing and a lovely brook with a clear running stream where we can catch our breath and replenish for the next stage of life's journey.

Lent should never be a time that makes us feel guilty...instead it should be a time that makes us feel, at the end, empowered and reinvigorated.

Our Lord never wants us to feel guilty but instead simply wants us to be all he has meant us to be. To grow closer to his divine being which is his will and purpose for all people.

We are justified by our faith and we already have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. For this reason, let us allow and trust him to direct what we should be so that we may walk humbly with him through the sorrow of his death and passion and into the joy of his resurrection; which is yet ours to live.

Here is wishing you all a rewarding Lenten preparation which ushers in new hopes, dreams and beginnings and sees you born anew.

I think it would not be unfair to describe Celia Hargrave as a tough cookie. She has a number of talks including one on running the Sable D'Or, a 130 mile race across the Sahara, and another on hiking in the Himalayas. She is hoping to fit in one more hundred-mile run to make it 100 of those before she stops running. However, neither of these talks seemed to guite fit the ethos of the Village Society, most of whose members are quite pleased when we make it from the car park to the village hall. So we booked her talk on gardening. However, the two talks mentioned above would probably have provided us with a useful insight into her attitude to gardening. She and her husband moved from Birmingham some 27 years ago because Celia wanted to give gardening a try. They bought a property near Sheepscombe called Trench Hill which was indeed neatly placed on the side of a hill and, with little prior experience, off she went. She now reckons the garden needs fifty to sixty hours' work each week to keep it up to scratch. If she plants tulips she does it by the thousand. Sons, daughters and grandchildren are all roped into the task. It is open to the public under the National Gardens Scheme twelve times a year.

However, I do have to say that her talk was the perfect antidote to a grey drizzly February day. Her slides were bursting with colour and her enthusiasm made you just want to get out there digging and pruning (though in my own case it soon wore off). It was gardening as a long term military campaign and I think all who attended would have had a really good night's sleep when we finally made it home. This was a super talk that makes me think we may have to organise a visit to one of her open days later in the year.

I mentioned last month that we were still working on a couple of talks. There was one in particular that I had hoped to get which was by the same lady, Celia Hargrave, on being a magistrate. However, on contacting her she said that she did not do that talk anymore and so I booked her for her talk on her garden. However, mentioning this to one of our regular members, Ann Carter, she said that she could give us a talk on being a magistrate since she had been one for many years. Having heard Ann talk on just this subject I booked her immediately for April. I would strongly recommend attendance at this. Her reminiscences are far from the dry business you might expect.

Then we have an old friend, Geoff North, coming back in November but we have still to decide which of his talks we will hear.

So if you are not a member do think of joining us. The fees for this year are £7 for a single and £14 for a couple or a family. It is so useful to be able to say that we represent a good selection of the village when we wish to protest about some of the more silly proposals by developers. Even if you are not particularly interested in the talks there is always our annual garden party in August when you get a free glass or two of lukewarm fizzy.



Village Hall

The stormy winter season has hit with a vengeance and Storms Ciara and Dennis have barreled their way across the Atlantic and given us a battering. So far Dennis has been the strongest but who knows what Ellen, Francis or Gerda et al may bring. As I sit here with my mug of Yorkshire Tea (milk, no sugar) and listening to some relaxing music as a counterpoint to the storm outside, I'm drawn to thinking of the past year, the future and the many plans we have for our Village Hall.

We're a small group of trustees on the committee and are all very busy elsewhere with other commitments, be they family, careers or other organisations. Our **Secretary** position is currently vacant and we'd love to get a team of just three or four **Bar Managers** together to help run the bar and free up the committee to deal with everything else that it takes to keep our Hall running. This is essentially a plea to arms as the past year has been phenomenally busy for us and a lot has been achieved since last March. More can still be achieved, but not without your help. A final call from myself would be for a **Vice-Chair** to help run some of the projects and help out where needed when I'm working away.

Since March 2019, we've overhauled the booking process with a website (svhall.co.uk), email address (swindonvillagehall@gmail.com), dedicated mobile phone and an amazing Booking Secretary (Jana). The results have been spectacular and the Hall is a busy and vibrant place whilst keeping the costs as affordable as possible.

Behind the bar, our regular Friday night openings are manned by a friendly, willing and growing group of volunteers and it's been amazing that we've been able to open every week for almost a year. Additionally we offer the bar to those wanting parties and have kept all the prices as low as we can so that the village has somewhere convenient, friendly and reasonably priced to share a drink or two with old friends and make some new ones. The range of drinks has been increased (especially the gin, a particular weakness of mine!) and the new TV looks great and will be used to show events in the future. Contactless card payments can be taken thanks to Karren's work as Treasurer and bar takings are a steady source of income for the hall, enabling us to make other improvements elsewhere. The bar is starting to look a little tired these days and a refurbishment would be amazing to do if we're able to collate a team of **Bar Managers** to look at what we'd like to change.

Some improvements are visible, others less so. The first big project we undertook was the installation of fourteen solar panels last summer and we are on track to produce £800 of electricity in the 12 months that follow. By my reckoning, the installation will be paid for in just over 4 years from now. Combined with the ambient cellar cooling (that is being utilised a lot at the moment as it draws cold outside air in to keep the cellar chilled instead of using the air conditioning system) and the wholesale replacement of every halogen light fitting with LEDs, our electricity consumption has reduced drastically and we are also producing our own, making our Hall a more efficient building to operate.

But we're not finished there. A project I would love to get off the ground is a sound system with two speakers (for now!) in the main hall so that anyone can play music from any source for functions, fitness classes, parties etc. We have some funds available but our most limiting factor is time. As I mentioned earlier, we are all busy with other things so this is a plea for any budding sound or film enthusiasts (amateur or professional makes no difference, we're all learning as we go along here!) to get in touch to help get this project going - if there's anything in particular you would like to see then this is your opportunity to make that happen (Swindon Village Film Society anybody?).

Following on from the great Christmas party, our **Easter Party** is ready to go on **Friday 3rd April** with a disco, kids' entertainments and food from 6pm.

We had to sadly cancel our 2019 New Year's Eve party due to a lack of volunteers but we're hoping to throw a worthy bash this year and are starting to think of ideas for what we can do and what you, as our fellow villagers, would like to see. If you have an idea or are able to give some time to make this a spectacular **New Year's Eve** to welcome 2021 then please email us with your thoughts.

Finally, it's the 75th anniversary of VE Day this year and, on **Friday 8th May**, we're having a special **VE Day celebration** (it's a Bank Holiday and later serving hours have been sanctioned by the authorities). To that end, we're organising some stalls, a photography competition (with the theme being Spring in Swindon Village - see our Facebook page for further details over the next few weeks), a treasure hunt for the younglings and young-atheart, a BBQ and an all-day bar, possibly with a disco.

If any of that sounds like your cup of tea (I've finished mine by the way but I might treat myself to another) then please get in touch by email as

additional help is always welcome - you're not committed to helping out forever but many hands really do make light work for everyone.
