

As you are aware, the playgroup changes hands in September.

Recently, I was talking to a lady – Pat Donovan- who worked at the first village playgroup back in 1969 / 1970. She remembered being in the old wooden village hall whilst the new one was being built. The old wooden building was chopped in half to make room for the new, and the open end was covered with a tarpaulin so the playgroup could still operate. Pat recalled many a time when the tarpaulin wasn't quite weatherproof, and they had to use buckets and towels to stop the rain coming in.

Although the Village Hall wasn't officially opened until late 1974, the playgroup was allowed to move in for the start of term in September 1974.

Pat was still working at the playgroup when my eldest daughter was there and we have fond memories of "duck, duck, goose" with Pat touching the children on their head – many of the children thought that was how she got her name!

SWINDON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Our regulars will know that there is no Village News published in August. You will be able to keep up to date with key issues via our website and Facebook page.

At the top of many people's list is Manor Road. James has been leading our efforts to understand why this has to have such a detrimental and prolonged impact on our lives. James included a fine explanation in the last issue of the Village News. The works on the gas main are now complete. However, Severn Trent's work continues. They are still working within their planned time but, in addition to reroutings, they have a leaking water main to fix. James is pressing for the footpath to be improved with proper ramps and a tarmac surface that all users will be able to transit in safety. We have had two site meetings with Persimmon. I reported that the attendees at the first meeting included Parish Councillor Sharon. Actually it was Lynne, but Sharon attended the second meeting. The meetings are useful in making sure that Persimmon and their contractors maintain their focus on getting this work finished as soon as possible.

The purchase of the Village Hall car park has hit issues with expensive repairs being necessary to the sewer. Some of the problems may be down to the high water table (we all know that the park floods in wet weather). We suspect that water may be flowing the wrong way through the sewer in adverse conditions. If the sewer were to collapse it would mean that the Village Hall toilets would be out of commission and the hall would not be usable. With this in mind the decision has been taken to close the one side of the car park to vehicles. We now need to work out exactly what is to be done, who will pay for it. It makes sense for us to try to get the work done during the school holidays when the hall is quiet.

We have four noticeboards in the parish and all are in need of some TLC. If we have any volunteer DIY folk out there looking for unpaid work we would love to hear from you. Materials and gratitude would be provided!

Work continues on the cycle path near Pitville Park and the racecourse roundabout. The scheme will result in major changes with the installation of traffic lights and reduced speed limits.

Local Council Clerk Week (LCCW) took place from 10th to 14th June. Its purpose was to "celebrate and raise awareness of the profile of the role of the clerk, and to recognise all the important and wide-ranging work we do for our communities." Even I was unaware of it!

The General Election takes place on 4th July. Don't forget that you will need to take photo id with you to be able to vote. At the recent Borough Council elections Frank Allen became one of our Borough Councillors. We have been delighted to see Frank at Parish Council meetings and on our most recent litter pick.

The website "Fix my Street" has proved useful in reporting all kinds of issues to the County and Borough Councils. I don't want to put you off the system (it normally works well) but my report of a blocked drain outside the school garnered 13 emails telling me that the problem was being investigated. I subsequently received an email saying that the problem had been addressed and that I would hear no more on the matter. Sadly I then received another 22 emails telling me the same thing!

Another minor victory for us. Many years ago (literally) one of our parish councillors and I met with a representative of the County Council footpaths team. We walked round the parish pointing out things that we would like to see fixed. There was much nodding and note taking and, of

course, nothing happened. When walking past Spirax Sarco on Runnings Road the other day I was astonished to see that one of our complaints, a missing footpath notice, had been addressed.

Finally, to tide you over until September here are a couple of quotes which amused me.

Gloucestershire Live interviewed the Cheltenham Town manager about the hard time his side was experiencing. "I felt we deserved it, certainly the players did after not scoring for 11 games." Not sure what you deserve after not scoring for 11 games. Relegation maybe?

Once a year the Village Society goes on an expedition. This year it was off to Northleach under the guidance of John Heathcott.

These days Northleach is a pleasant but unremarkable Cotswold town but a few centuries ago it was a place of some importance. It was the centre for wool and wool was where the money was. You can tell this when you look at much of the housing towards the centre; fine buildings for important people. Of course there was lesser housing, now very attractive because of its age. But as you walk around you also note the charity that was afforded to the poor by way of alms houses and even a workhouse for the very poor where charity was severely limited.

One thing I had not realised is that the town square was once over twice the size. Right now it is actually a town triangle but that is because there has been building diagonally across the square and that there is actually another town triangle in the other side of these buildings. So, on my visits I had been missing half the town.

Of course we visited the church; this is large and impressive and it has superb perpendicular pillars and windows. However, it was built much of a piece from sheep money and so lacks some of the layers of history that other local churches have including our own St Lawrence's. Then after the church it was off to the prison, not because of the poor behaviour of some of the group but because that was where we had left the cars and the fact that it is now a very good cafe combined with a prison museum and a collection of aged farm wagons. No fee for the museums, just buy a coffee. This was a great visit and as ever the enjoyment was doubled because of John's wonderful knowledge of such towns and his easy way of passing it on.



We finally resolved our gardens visit in July. We have been trying to make our destination a garden in Gretton, advertised under the National Garden Scheme programme. However, we have now found out that the owners are moving and so have withdrawn from the scheme without telling us. So we have made a virtue of necessity and the gardens this year will be those of our own Swindon Hall. Between us we have six gardens and all will be open to the cognoscenti. I can only say that they vary in style and character but together make an interesting venue.

Entry is free to members and non members will be welcome for £3 if you let me know you are coming in advance at <u>barry_simon@hotmail.com</u>. There will be tea and buns afterwards. Date and times on the front cover.

So, to August, when we have our annual garden party in the streaming rain. This is a member's only do and it is back to No 3, Swindon Hall, where, if the weather is indeed as predicted above, the lukewarm wine in will be grudgingly doled out in the kitchen.

In September Dr Tim Brain will return to tell us again the tale of Gloucestershire in the 2007 floods. Strongly recommended.

Finally, I will remind you that we have agreed to include the village in the annual Heritage Open Days programme for the first time in a few years. So on Saturday 14th September we will invite visitors from the area to a talk on 'The History of Swindon Village', most probably in St Lawrence's Church. This will be followed by a walk around the village to see our more historic sites. If you are new to the village this is a good time to find out about where you live. The talk and walk will be free but the tea and buns afterwards can be purchased and any profits go to church funds.



RECTORY REFLECTIONS - REV JACQUELINE

This year, Paris will be hosting the Olympics – a three week extravaganza from 26th July to 11th August, of competition in an increasingly varied range of sports. Every four years the Games are staged to showcase the best human values, like fair play, respect and the courage to strive for excellence. These values are not just important to sport; they underpin the fabric of society and democracy.

The Olympics trace back over 2,000 years to ancient Greece and have always been more than a mere display of athletic prowess. They were an opportunity for Greek citizens to unite, celebrate their democracy and display their remarkable athletic skills. In the late 1800's, people around the world were ready for a modern version of the games and wanted to compete with different nations and celebrate peace and friendship.

As we watch Olympians from all walks of life, religions and backgrounds, we will I am sure be impressed by the competitors who have devoted their lives to perfecting their skills for this competition. The amount of time and commitment required for this one moment is awe-inspiring. I hope that their prowess will inspire us all to try whatever skill might be lying dormant inside us. As someone who was built for comfort rather than speed, I suspect my skills might lie in the 'arts'! But we do all have something we can offer.

Watching these Olympians strive will, I'm sure, bring people together in community, as we cheer, commiserate and celebrate. We are designed to be together, in community, to love and support. It is my hope that the Olympics will be a time when the world comes together and makes a stand for the original values of the Games – respect, excellence and friendship. Good luck Team GB.

Well, so far this summer has been a mixed bag! We've had a heat wave, followed by storms, and now, a period of colder, wetter weather. The garden is lush and thriving and I'm managing to avoid lugging around watering cans to water the containers.

Preoccupation with the weather is a very British phenomenon and the subject is often used as a conversation tool when we make small talk. There is a myth that the Romans left Britain because they were fed up with cooler, wetter weather. I have some sympathy when I see holiday makers making the best of things whilst struggling with wet tents, children and inclement weather.

We sometimes take our rain and provision of water for granted. It's perhaps only when we hear about hosepipe bans or water companies in crisis that we pay more attention to where our water is coming from. The bible story of the Samaritan woman who went to the well to collect her water (John 4. 5-30) is one which still reminds us of how fortunate we are in the UK to be able to have water piped into our homes. The woman's encounter with Christ at the well was one which quickly developed into a discussion about her brokenness, lifestyle choices and how she could break away from the barriers she had carefully put up.



We all want for things in life, perhaps a new car, or a better job or the most up-to-date technology, but these things are only a temporary fix. Christ offers us all, whoever and wherever we are, a relationship with Him which gives us permanence and a sense of belonging. Christ sees through our superficial desires and offers us living water, where we will be sustained through a constant flow of grace which will quench our spiritual thirst.

Throughout the scriptures then, water is a powerful image. It is that which refreshes and satisfies and sustains. This is why water is used during baptism services. It is salvation and the glory of God. It is abundant life. It is the presence of God with us. It is a force that works in our lives in just the way we need. That is just the start of what Jesus offered to the woman at the well, and it is what he offers to each one of us every day. All that remains is for us to say the words of the Samaritan woman. "Please, give me some of that water."





Best wishes for all of them and a long and strong life to SVEY!





Go grow with Dale

Hello Gardeners, it's been a fairly chilly start to the summer, it seems our seasons are far from predictable the past few years.

With this summer being cool and fairly wet at times so far, those pesky garden pests, namely slugs and snails, must be having the time of their lives. I almost lost a Courgette just the other day from slug attack and because of the lack of heat, something courgettes love, it's slow to recover.

Since then, I've upped my defences in the form of more 'Beer Traps'. For these, I use small glass ramekins (any shallow container will do though) and put them near the plants I want to protect before filling them with beer. Obviously cheap beer is a good way to go, I've been using cheap stouts of late. They're so effective I usually have to empty and refill them every couple of weeks as they're so full of slugs by then. Be sure to have one beer trap every square meter if the slugs are particularly bad.

The science behind it is rather hilarious, slugs love the yeasty smell of beer, meaning non-alcoholic beer works too, go in for a sip, have no self-control on how much they should drink, fall in and drown.

Something else I do to assist my vegetables is grow Nasturtiums close by, they're irresistible to mainly Aphids but Caterpillars as well. They're edible and they drape down from pots/raised beds so they don't invade precious vegetable growing space.

Hopefully these couple of tips will assist your garden this summer.
