

Swindon Parish and Community Website: https://swindonparish.org.uk I know you all love to hear about Manor Road roadworks. Here is the latest. Manor Road will be closed on 17th March from its junction with Runnings Road to its junction with Manor Court. The closure will be in effect from 9:00am until 5:00pm to allow for resurfacing works.

As I write this, we are finalising our arrangements to plant two memorial trees in Old Mill Way. The trees will be a tribute to former Parish Councillors David Iliffe and Helen Wells. Many of you will have known David and Helen, two highly respected and well-liked councillors who worked tirelessly for their community.

Staying in Old Mill Way, the path is very muddy. This is a problem whenever we have wet weather (it is lucky it is such a rare occurrence in England!). We feel that the best solution is to lay down wood chippings. They are environmentally friendly, but the downside is that they do not last long and have to be refreshed. We sourced some from the tree works we had done recently. We are now trying to

source some more.



As we anticipated, the closure of the Cheltenham recycling centre appears to be resulting in an increase in fly tipping. This was the scene outside the allotments; a sunny day defiled. Who does this? If you know please contact the police. You can do so anonymously if you prefer.

I recently saw another report of a fly tipper dumping lots of household waste, including old household bills with their name and address. Selfish and stupid! The result was a large fine.





The clothing recycling bins at Sainsbury's continue to be overflowing. We have pleaded that they should be emptied more frequently. The result at present is an eyesore that does no-one any credit.

Remember that the recycling bins behind the Salvation Army Donation Centre in Rutherford Way (off the roundabout near Sainsbury's) are close by.



Our war on graffiti continues. We are reporting the examples we find and hope that you will do the same. You can use Fix My Street (fixmystreet.com) to report this and many other problems.

We are in touch with Galliford Try, one of the house builders who are involved in the building out of Elms Park. They have a corporate responsibility to engage with the local community. Obviously it looks good for them but hopefully it will also bring benefits to us.

## RECTORY REFLECTIONS - REV JACQUELINE





# The parish of St Lawrence, Swindon Village with St Peter, Cheltenham

Every 6 years the Church of England does an updated count of how many members it has. Currently St Lawrence, Swindon Village with St Peter, Cheltenham has 36 on the Church Electoral Roll (not to be confused with the Parliamentary Electoral Register).

Joining the Church Electoral Roll means that you can vote on Church matters, attend and vote at the Annual Parochial Church meeting and stand for election to the PCC. Being on the Church Electoral Roll is a way of demonstrating your willingness to help shape the future of the Church, not just locally, but nationally.

This year we have to ask everyone to register afresh. We cannot carry over any existing names, so even if you have previously registered you will need to register again.

#### **Broadband in Swindon Parish**

Some time ago I wrote about the varying internet speeds people were experiencing in the area. Things have moved on. I have recently received more queries about the current broadband initiatives. I have done a bit of research in an attempt to clarify the players, their roles and the current state of affairs.

Starting with the basics, there are infrastructure companies that dig up the streets and there are internet service providers (ISPs) who use the buried cables to offer you access to the internet (and perhaps TV and telephone services). A few companies span both these roles.



In Gloucestershire there is a joint initiative with Herefordshire called Fastershire. The aim of the project is to bring broadband to areas that are not attractive to commercial developers.

On their website there is a good explanation of the different types (and speeds) of broadband connection. The slowest uses copper wires throughout. The next level uses fibre optic cables to the street cabinet (the ones with graffiti on them - another story!) then copper wires from the cabinet to your house. The best connections use fibre optic cables throughout.

Copper wires throughout might give you a speed of 20Mbps. Fibre to the cabinet will give you roughly 4 times the speed while full fibre (sounds like All Bran) might give you 50 times the speed or more.

The first fibre optic connections to homes were made by Telewest many years ago. The company became Virgin Media in 2007. Virgin Media is its own internet service provider but only covers certain areas. It doesn't make its infrastructure available to other companies.



Through the Fastershire initiative Openreach, Gigaclear and CityFibre have been digging up our streets installing fibre optic cables. None of these companies offer internet services to domestic subscribers. They provide the infrastructure through which internet service providers such as Plus Net and Talk Talk provide their services.

Netomnia is another company active in the area. They lay cables using existing ducting and telegraph poles. At present Netomnia has a single service provider - its sister company You Fibre. Other ISPs will be available shortly. I had a very useful chat with Netomnia. They were keen to answer my questions and were refreshingly transparent about their plans. They also highlighted that they offer social (reduced cost) tariffs for people on low incomes or on benefits. Other ISPs may do the same but they tend not to publicise it.

Annoyed that your road is being dug up multiple times?

I have received this explanation from Gloucestershire County Council.



"Cheltenham as a whole, has a range of different network operators who have publicly announced commercial plans to build rival gigabit capable networks across the town.

These include City Fibre, Openreach and Netomnia. These are all private companies, and they are using their own private capital to fund the delivery. Cheltenham is seen as quite an attractive area for suppliers to invest, hence why there is competition here. Moving forward, properties that aren't part of any commercial delivery plans, will be the responsibility of central government under Building Digital UK (BDUK), but it's likely most of Cheltenham will be done commercially."

The Society has not had a meeting since the last edition but not to worry. There must be something I can rabbit on about.


Now in that last report I did give much of this year's programme but there were two slots unfilled, so that gives me a starter. In May we now have Nicola Potter coming to give us a talk on 'Metal Detecting and Finds'. When I contacted Nicola I had no idea where she lived. However, I was soon made aware that she is actually from Wyman's Brook and her children either have been to or at our Village School. So not only is she very local but we don't have to pay any travel expenses. Apparently Nicola helps to run a local group of folk who undertake metal detecting and she will be bringing along some of their local finds. I may even be able to persuade her to organise a trawl of Swindon Hall grounds and find that pound coin I lost five years ago that has been on my mind ever since. That leaves only September empty but I do have a speaker available should he be needed and if nothing else cries out to be heard before then. So we have a full programme.

Now, although that is all the Society business I have to report, I will go on to mention something that many people may not be aware of. We all know that the First World War was a dreadful business. No nation was prepared for the trench warfare that took place. Britain suffered about one million casualties. Of those almost half a million have no known resting place. In the heat of battle many bodies were never recovered from the battlefield mud. Others were quickly buried near to where they were found and a cross constructed from whatever came to hand, wood from empty ammunition boxes, ruined buildings or fencing.

If the soldier's identity was known it would be marked on the cross and if not they would be 'A soldier known only unto God'. Later many such bodies were recovered and given a more appropriate resting place in one of the formal cemeteries over in France. What is more, some of the temporary crosses were kept and some of those relating to men local to Cheltenham have been collected, restored from their invariably poor condition and made available to be displayed in a small building in Cheltenham's cemetery in Prestbury.

Further, pupils from Pittville School have, where possible, researched the individual's history and their tales have been recorded on notices placed alongside the crosses. If you go to the cemetery there are signs directing you to the small building containing these memorials which is kept unlocked. You can park close by and go in to read the tales and see the crosses. There are good information notices inside and outside. I recommend a visit to pay remembrance to brave local men. It is both informative and touching.

I will now repeat a bit of the last newsletter notice. We are not increasing subscriptions this year. They will stay at £10 for a single and £20 for a couple or family. New members will be very welcome. If you are new to the area and want to know more of what we do, send me an e-mail at barry\_simon@hotmail.com. Our aim is primarily to keep the Village a decent area to live in and support the Parish Council in their efforts to do the same. Our knowledge of local history has several times been helpful in fending off uncaring developers whose main motive is just profit.

## Cook with us

Vegetables that are in season during MARCH are..

Artichoke, Beetroot, Carrots, Chicory, Leeks, Parsnip, Purple Sprouting Broccoli, Radishes, Rhubarb, Sorrel, Spring Greens, Spring Onions, Watercress

Nothing beats having homemade soup for a cold winters lunch... Now I have a soup maker... it's so much easier..

One of our favourites is Broccoli and Stilton, Serves 4

## <u>Ingredients</u>

- Onion
- One Medium potato peeled
- Tenderstem broccoli (as much as you can chop up .. the more the tastier)
- 500ml Veggie stock (add more liquid if soup is a bit too thick)
- 40g Stilton cheese or cheddar.. (or as much as you like to your own taste)
- Seasoning salt & pepper

## **Method**

- \* Chop up onion, potato and tenderstem broccoli
- \* Place in a saucepan, or soup maker, with stock and seasoning
- \* Bring to a boil... simmer until veggies are tender (15-20 mins)
- \* Blitz with a hand blender if not using a soup maker
- \* Add cheese and give a quick blitz

Hello Village Gardeners! March is finally upon us, the start of the growing season for most.

This month I think it's a good idea to go back to basics and talk about how to get a head start on the growing season.

Growing from seed is by far the cheapest way to start your planting season, nowadays there are a variety of ways to get your seeds growing. Some newer methods I came across last year were Heated Propagators or heat mats, similar to those used for homebrew beer, that heat your seed trays slightly to really speed up germination and growth as much as 30%! Ideal if your windowsill space is limited or if your greenhouse is too cold this time of year. Generally these heat mats only use 20w of Electricity at most, so it would cost pennies to use.

One seedling investment I made last year were a few 30 cell rubber seed trays. Traditionally thin plastic ones are both easy to break and difficult to recycle. These rubber seed trays obviously cost a little more, around £10 each (I was lucky with a Webbs clearance bargain late last year for half that), but will last forever and are unbelievably easy to extract seedlings and attached soil from.

Lastly, something I learnt rather recently, seeds/seedlings in their first few weeks of life don't really care about soil nutrition. Hence it's a good idea to use some sieved spent compost as seed sowing mixture, just as long as it's pest/worm free! This saves paying for bags from the Garden Centre.

I can't wait to start growing this year and I hope some of the above inspires you to grow more from seed this year!


