FOREWORD by

Over the past ten years substantial development has taken place in Swindon Parish, particularly in the area of the Village. Where before, communication between the Parish Council and the residents was a fairly simple matter, it is today difficult for the Parish Council to be at all sure that the views and wishes of those who live in the Parish are known. It is hoped, through the introduction of this newsletter, to give residents information about local activities of all kinds and to promote interest in Village affairs.

The reorganisation of local government puts additional responsibilities on Parish Councils. It is proper that local people should take part, make their views felt, and try to achieve the kind of environment and living conditions they want. To enable the Parish Council to take advantage of the procedures available for representation to District Authorities, it is up to all the residents to see that they play as full a part as possible by communicating their views to the Parish Councillors or by writing to the Council.

# PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 19th AUGUST 1974

#### PLANNING MATTERS

An application to extend the MOOG factory, Runnings Road, was opposed by the Council because it would encroach into the buffer zone, lessening the gap between industrial and residential areas which a public enquiry Inspector had previously referred to as an essential feature of future planning policy. The Council agreed that if the planning application was considered favourably then they should be consulted about planting additional trees for screening.

An application by R.H. Baird & Sons of Hyde Farm for the erection of an agricultural worker's dwelling to the west of Home Farm was objected to by the Council because the proposed siting of the dwelling was well outside the established area for development and it was felt that there might be other sites more suitable.

An application by the Village Hall Management Committee for a new Village Hall on the existing site was considered favourably by the Council but they added to their approval a rider that the present single width access to the site should be improved.

#### VILLAGE HALL FUNDING

A special meeting a few years ago established the residents' approval in principle to a grant towards the cost of a new Village Hall. The provisional offer of grants by Gloucestershire Education Committee (£3,243) and D.E.S. (£6,486), together with the £5,000 raised voluntarily (and including the £2,000 gift from the Robert Hitchins Charitable Trust) still leaves more needed. The Chairman of the Hall Committee reported that he is now approaching Tewkesbury Borough Council for grant aid. The Parish Council agreed that following upon a reply from the Borough the Parish Council could consider what grant aid it should then offer.

#### ROAD SAFETY

The P.T.A. had written to the Council pointing out that, consequent upon the probable closure of the private bus service from Wymans Brook Estate to the Swindon Village School and the withdrawal of the Crossing Patrol Warden (due to lack of volunteers), the danger of the fast moving traffic to the smaller children crossing and walking along Wymans Lane has been highlighted.

The Council agreed that the pavement is rather narrow and Cheltenham Borough Council should be approached with a view to allowing the Parish Council to lay a footpath on the inside of the park boundary fence. The problems in introducing a speed limit through the Village were complex and depended on the results of a traffic census and the provision of street lights. A previous application had been refused but further approaches would be made.

# SWINDON VILLAGE HALL

A a Committee Meeting held in the Hall on Wednesday, 11th September, the Chairman, Mr. H.J. Murrell, informed the members that he had received an offer of a provisional grant towards the cost of a new Village Hall.

The offer was well below what had been expected and would necessitate the Hall being built in two phases.

The Committee had agreed that the provisional grants should be accepted and the architect be requested to prepare specifications for Phase 1 in order that they should go out to tender. The Committee approved that the Chairman should approach Tewkesbury Borough Council for aid towards this project. It was also agreed that the Chairman should submit to Gloucestershire Community Council a request for Grant Aid for Phase 2, this request to be submitted no later than 25th September.

The Chairman informed the Committee of the undertakings of the Hall Management Committee when the Grant Aid for Phase 1 was finally approved and the timetable of happenings, the most important being that the tenders for Phase 1 having to be submitted to the Community Council by 12th October. Once the grants had been sanctioned then the building must commence within three months. The Community Council also deemed that 25% of the cost of Phase 2 will have to be met from voluntary sources.

With this in mind the Chairman reminded members that our fund raising must continue. The waste paper collection must be intensified, more members obtained for the weekly lottery, and the annual Christmas Draw should be projected on a larger scale.

# SWINDON VILLAGE SCHOOL P.T.A.

The P.T.A. has been active recently, mainly in finishing the School swimming pool which has been built at a cost of approx. £1,500 by parents, teachers, and friends. It was officially opened at the Family Night Out on Saturday,

7th September, and will be in use during the autumn.

Other fund raising events held during the year have included the May Fair, Harvest Supper, Kite Flying Contest, Disco, etc. The P.T.A. were unfortunately unable to organise many events in the School during last winter owing to the fuel crisis but it is hoped that more will be held during the coming year, when your continued support will be appreciated. We would like to thank everyone who has helped in many ways with the building of the swimming pool.
